From the Rabbi

I had not planned to write about Donald Trump again this month. I had the opportunity to speak about him and his candidacy through the fall and winter. But for those who may not have heard, or may have preferred to not have deliberately heard, I am not a fan.

Now by saying that, I do not feel that compels me to share publicly which of the other Republican candidates I might have preferred, or if I preferred any of

them to Hillary Clinton or Bernie Sanders. I suspect that after almost 20 years of service to the JCCP/CBT, you know that I strongly oppose religious leaders serving congregations of any denomination making their personal political choices public, and especially endorsing any candidate on both ethical and legal grounds. That is why I opposed "Rabbis for Obama" in both 2008 and 2012, and opposed "Rabbis for Romney", with no less vigor. The synagogue can be a place for political discussion and even debate. It must be a place that allows for the free exchange of ideas so that we might learn from one another. But that can't take place when the religious leader of a congregation has clearly taken one side or another. And then tried to convince you that this is what G-d, the Torah, or the Rabbis of old would have done.

Yet the candidacy of Donald Trump, the presumptive Republican nominee, raises certain issues that do merit a response from the religious community. The controversy that has surrounded him, and what I would argue is the abysmal and irresponsible behavior that he and some of his handlers have exhibited during his campaign, have raised legitimate questions about how he would lead this nation, and whether or not he could bring healing and unity to a nation desperate for it. I would further argue that his campaign has exploited the divisions that exist between Americans to its fullest advantage. So just as I have publicly raised concerns about Hillary's emails, Bernie's seeming indifference to all things Jewish and Israel, Rand Paul's dangerous flirtations with white supremacists, and even then democratic candidate Senator Barak Obama and his background and longtime relationship with a Chicago hate monger/minister named Jeremiah Wright, and the church that enabled him, then I have absolutely no concern for raising issues about "The Donald" whose campaign was too often based upon appeals to misogyny, bigotry, xenophobia, and downright racism, or his inability until recently to disavow the support of white supremacists, or his justification of violence which his rallies have attracted.

Whether you agree with me or not, you must admit at least I am consistent.

Any candidate whether we like them or not, whether we plan to vote for them or not, whether they like Israel or not, whose words and deeds mock the very values that our Judaism holds dear, values without which this great nation of ours would cease to exist, must be challenged, and even reconsidered in light of those values.

THE DEADLINE FOR THE **NEXT BULLETIN IS JULY 25!** And this is particularly significant during this time of the year as we read from the middle of the Book of Leviticus, literally, the very center of the Torah. At this very middle of the Torah is what scholars call the "Holiness Code". What is important about this section is its message, which teaches that the concept of holiness is not something that is reserved for just the Priests of Israel, but rather all Israel. Both individually as well as communally, we either uphold the world by adhering to a higher moral and ethical standard, and reap the rewards and benefits of that decision, or choose not to, and bear the consequences. Incidentally, it is in this section where so much of the "peace love and justice" stuff for which the Torah and Jewish tradition is famous, is actually found.

I want to challenge you with the following question. Each of you remembers some outlandish statement that Donald Trump has made at some point or another since he began his candidacy last spring. How could you not? He has dominated the news since the day he began his run for the nation's highest office. So remember one statement, one outlandish statement that he made about women, about Hispanics, about immigrants, about immigrant Hispanics, about Muslims, to name a few. Remember what he said about them and as you are searching for the grains of truth among them, and there are grains of truth which is why so many angry people have pinned their hopes to Trump, (and Bernie Sanders too, but we will deal with him another time) and let's try something. Let's delete the word, immigrant, or Hispanic, or whatever and insert the word Jews.

And let's think about that statement for a moment. I'm sure our enemies could find grains of truth in that statement as well. Of course they could, because within the last hundred years, everything that Donald Trump said about these groups has been said about the Jewish people. And millions followed and supported and voted for the politicians who said them!

Would you put your hopes in our great nation in a person who said such outlandish things?

Shop Til You Drop, or Not

And more importantly, what are they doing to us, our society, our environment, and our economic well-being?"

Chesed – Righteousness – requires a concern for human welfare: it is the belief that our primary moral obligation is the improvement of human welfare. Styles change so rapidly, enabling stores to con-

stantly change their inventory. That creates more jobs in the industrial countries, but those jobs are low paying with longer hours – essentially, sweatshop conditions. Is it hypocritical of us to give charity to the poor at the same time we create the conditions that breed poverty? When people are doing our work for wages we would not accept, when the resources of the world are controlled by the few, we must ask whether we are truly religious.

One of the intangible benefits of synagogue membership is that this is the place where we get to ask hard questions. It is the arena where we are confronted with the stark moral issues of our society. Judaism (and true religion of all faiths) calls us to live the principles of action, kindness and resilience. The synagogue community rejects complacency, breaks through bureaucracy, and challenges corruption. Doing what's right, not what's easy.

We know the facts. We know what we should be doing. We know that shopping doesn't make us better; it just makes us busier. What if, instead of being just one more place to look for "more" and "better," Jewish life could be a vehicle for escape from this compulsion? What if, instead of being driven to get more, Jewish life could be the place Jews awoke to gratitude for what they have in each moment?

In a society driven by the fantasy that perfection is purchasable – the perfect pair of shoes, the perfect house, perfect children and the perfect life - the only comfort truly attainable is the realization that we are blessed when we have those moments of acceptance, when we accept the foibles and follies of our family, friends, employees and colleagues and ultimately ourselves.

Chesed demands standing with the poor, listening to voices unheard, and recognizing potential where others see despair. It thrives on moral imagination: the humility to see the world as it is, and the audacity to imagine the world as it could be.


Finally, I wish only the greatest success to Howie Leopold and his incoming administration, and to all of you simply "Thank You".

Anyway, here's a favorite recipe that you can use all year...including break-the-fast, brunch, or even a fun dairy dinner. Rob only likes plain cheese blintzes. I always double this recipe... but remember to line up the plain blintzes and put some sort of divider there...so that he knows which ones are for him. Everyone else loves the blueberry or cherry ones. Ask your family for their favorites first before deciding which ones to use.

- 2 packages frozen blintzes
- 6 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 pound butter, melted
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- dash of salt
- 1/4 cup orange juice

Melt butter in a 12 \times 9 pan. Line the pan with blintzes.

Put all the remaining ingredients in a blender and pour over the blintzes.

Sprinkle cinnamon on the top.

Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Serve immediately.

TISHA B'AV SERVICES 2016 ~ 5776



Please join us on <u>Saturday evening</u>, <u>August 13th at 8:45 PM</u> as we begin the observance of *Tisha B'Av*, the saddest day of the year in the Jewish calendar. Tisha B'Av, The Fast of the Ninth of Av, is a day of mourning to commemorate the destruction of the first and second Temples, as well as many other tragedies that have befallen the Jewish people. Our service will include the Ma'ariv service and chanting of the Megillat Eichah (Lamentations) by Rabbi Avram Kogen and JCCP/CBT members Arthur Abrams, Judy Jaffe, and Dr. Richard Winters.

Sunday morning, August 14, 2016 at 9 AM

The morning service for Tisha B'Av is unlike any other morning service of the year. Following the tradition of Rabbi Meir of Rothenburg of the 13th century, we do not wear Talit or Tefillin at the Shacharit service. We mourn for the martyrs of our people on this day reciting special prayers after the morning service known as Kinot.

A special early Mincha Service will be held at 1:30 pm on Sunday afternoon. During the Mincha Service, Talit and Tefillin are worn, signifying the waning of the intense sorrow of the day.






In closing, I want to wish you all a wonderful, relaxing, healthy and peaceful summer.


