# From the Rabbi

Are young Jews turning away from Israel? This question has been the subject of much concern and controversy in recent years. Rabbis, demographers and communal leaders have analyzed the data and marshaled anecdotal evidence to support their views.

It's terribly difficult to deduce the answer to this question for several reasons. To begin, the relationship of American Jews to Israel has itself undergone a revolution in the past decade or so. I believe that American Jews remain concerned and engaged with Israel. And with the success of programs such as Birthright Israel, a very high percentage of young Jews between the ages of 18 and 30 have or will visit Israel in the near future – the highest number in American history. But their engagement and concern is demonstrated in a vastly different way than the previous generation.

A generation ago, we may have demonstrated our concern and support by a passionate defense of the positions taken by Israel's democratically elected government, however controversial, without considering the possibility that such decisions might be at variance with our own vision and sense of justice. But because of Israel's relative insecurity with regard to its neighbors, and our own insecurity as American Jews, this model was comfortable and we could easily see its benefits.

Today, however, Israel has grown more secure and become stronger even despite the hostile climate of the Middle East. American Jews have also become more comfortable and secure in our position in this nation. So for many Jews, concern for Israel now means speaking out and voicing criticisms of Israel's policies in a manner that would have been unthinkable even a few short years ago. (These are some of the issues that we have been exploring and studying in my Fall Adult Education class called "Engaging Israel.") Such criticism, though by no means limited to younger Jews, has been challenged vigorously by others in the Jewish community. And indeed, often times the response to such criticism has been to not only refute the charges but also to challenge the pro-Israel bona fides of those offering the criticism.

We have seen two examples of this in recent months. In a particularly ugly incident at the Kotel, the Western Wall, the holiest site in the world for the Jewish people, a group of Jewish women were prevented from worshiping in a manner of their own choosing. This terrible incident pointed out the ultra-Orthodox religious monopoly both at the Kotel and in Israeli religious life, and the difficulties facing non-Orthodox Judaism in establishing its own institutions in Israel. And many, including this rabbi, spoke out. Criticism of Israel's handling of this issue came from so many whose passion and love of Israel cannot possibly be challenged. In similar incidents in the past, incidents with which many were familiar, we did not raise our voices in protest. This time, however, many spoke out in protest. What changed? A growing sense in many segments of the pro-Israel community that Israel is not undermined but actually strengthened when those who care deeply for its welfare are willing to challenge it when it makes mistakes.

Last month's hostilities between Israel and Hamas also led many to criticize Israel's military tactics. I personally rejected and continue to reject many of the false and unfair accusations leveled against Israel and its responsibility to defend its citizens. Yet here also, while it was easy for me to refute so many of the actual charges against Israel, it would be unfair to say that all those who leveled these criticisms, however misguided and unfair, are anti-Israel. Indeed because I personally know or am familiar with many of these individuals, I know they are deeply committed to Israel and that their criticism, despite my own (negative) opinion of it, was actually motivated by their concern for Israel's welfare. Indeed, such criticism does not reflect disengagement from Israel but rather, in a challenging and new way, a different type of engagement that is hard to quantify, yet demonstrates an active interest in Israel and its well-being.

Every rabbi knows this story. If a person comes to me and says, "I want to know if this food is kosher because I might wish to eat it" then I can have a conversation with such a person. We are both committed to the idea of kashrut (Jewish dietary laws) and ultimately we are simply discussing the parameters of what is and is not within the system. But if a person says to me, "Rabbi, no matter what, I am going to eat it," then there really cannot be much of a conversation because we are both operating under a different set of assumptions.

And so it is with the question of engagement with Israel. We need to understand who is engaged and who is not, but also with equal effort try to better understand the changing nature of what it actually means to be engaged with Israel. And when we fully understand this new reality, we will be better able to allow all the disparate voices of those who care deeply about Israel to have an equal place at the table. I am sure that would have the most positive effect on encouraging the type of love and commitment for Israel, so characteristic of our community in past generations, to continue to flourish for future generations as well.

# **President's Message**

#### We Are One

It isn't very often that one has the privilege of hearing a genuine hero speak. On November 14, my 15-year-old daughter, Sophia, and I were privileged to be at the Kaplen JCC on the Palisades in Tenafly to hear the former Soviet refusenik and current chairman of the Jewish Agency for Israel, Natan Sharansky, speak to an overflow crowd. The crowd included several members of our own JCCP community, including David Goodman, who as the president of the Jewish Federation of Northern New Jersey had the honor of introducing Sharansky to the crowd. I was pleased that it didn't take much coaxing to get my daughter to join me for this special event. She had become interested in Natan Sharansky after learning about his inspirational life while writing a paper about him when she was in the eighth grade at the Solomon Schechter Day School of Bergen County. The event proved to be inspirational for both of us, and reminded us just how precious freedom really is and the importance of the Jewish community staying united. With Israel defending itself against Hamas missiles coming from Gaza while Sharansky spoke, the lesson was underscored.

Sharansky spoke without notes in heavily Russian-accented but clearly understandable English. The occasion was to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the Freedom Sunday march on December 6, 1987, when some 250,000 people, most but not all of them Jews, rallied on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., in support of freedom for their Jewish brethren imprisoned behind the Soviet Iron Curtain. It became the largest protest on behalf of a Jewish cause ever held in the United States and helped to mobilize all of the disparate elements of the entire Jewish community - religious and secular alike - behind a single cause. The rally had been strategically planned for the day before a historic summit meeting at the White House between President Ronald Reagan and the leader of the Soviet Union, Mikhail Gorbachev, and was intended to send a message to Gorbachev.

Sharansky, who had spent nine vears in a Moscow prison on phony charges of being an American spy until his release and immigration to Israel in February 1986, had been the moving force behind the historic rally. It was the culminating event of a generation-long struggle by American Jews to help win freedom for Soviet Jews (including my own Russian cousins, now living in Brooklyn) behind the ubiquitous slogan that I remember so well from my youth: We Are One.

In his talk, Sharansky lamented the fact that one of the most significant events in recent Jewish history had largely been forgotten and the lessons learned had not been passed down to the next generation. He stressed how united the disparate elements of the Jewish community had been in the long struggle to help free Soviet Jews. He recalled that the driving force behind the movement to free Soviet Jews had come from the most unlikely of sources: a post-Holocaust "army" of what his KGB captors derided as "students and housewives" who were determined not to sit in silence while their brethren were oppressed and trapped in the Soviet Union.

Sharansky reminded us that in fact it had been these brave students. housewives and tourists who had smuggled siddurim and books on Jewish history and culture, as well as religious objects, into the Soviet Union, which helped Soviet Jews to rediscover their Jewish identity that had been suppressed by decades of brutal Communist rule. Knowing that there were fellow Jews living on the other side of the world who cared about their plight and were willing to put their own safety at risk strengthened the resolve of Soviet Jews to continue their struggle for freedom. He also told us that these acts of bravery on behalf of their Soviet brethren had the unexpected benefit of helping American Jews to rediscover their own identity as Jews.

Sharansky reminded the crowd that in order to strengthen the connection from generation to generation, we as Jews always recount the Exodus from Egypt. The historic movement to free Soviet Jews should also be remembered because it was through the efforts of ordinary American Jews that more than 1 million Soviet Jews gained

their freedom and were able to leave and become Israeli citizens, while over half a million became citizens of the United States. They were liberated from slavery and their modern-day Exodus was aided by a determined "army" of "students and housewives" who mobilized themselves under the slogan We Are One. As Sharansky wrote recently in The Wall Street Journal: "As in ancient Egypt, the desire of Soviet Jews to claim their national identity joined with a driving thirst to be liberated from bondage. In this union of identity and freedom lies an enduring lesson for Jews everywhere, and by extension, for other persecuted peoples as well."

Last month we had a movie and pizza night, and our own Chanukah dinner with latkes, jelly donuts and an old fashioned grab bag. A good time was had by all.


We also joined with the Hebrew School in our annual Chanukah Extravaganza/Rooftop Menorah Lighting.

# **Early Childhood Center**

The weekly celebration of Shabbat in our Early Childhood Center classrooms is a beloved fixture in the children's routine. Besides promoting spiritual development and basic Jewish competence, the kabbalat Shabbat experience crosses all domains and engages all the senses. Young children thrive on routine, and what is ritual if not a routine? Week in and week out, we gather together, recite or sing the blessings, and sing our songs. Week in and week out, we kindle white light, drink purple grape juice, and indulge in soft, fluffy challah.

One of the loveliest things about our Shabbat celebrations is that each child has a turn, on a rotating basis, to be the host by providing challah for his/her classmates. Usually the child's parent (or maybe a grandparent) comes to school to share Shabbat with us. The parent usually brings a favorite storybook to read to the class. One parent who travels to New Orleans regularly brought a Creole (or was it Cajun?) version of the "Three Little Pigs," and proceeded to read with the appropriate accent.

Occasionally someone brings something other than a book: One parent, a neurologist, brought a model of the brain to the Pre-K class! The children didn't understand too much, but they were fascinated, and the doctor's child felt very important indeed. Sometimes parents bring a special art activity that they plan with the classroom teacher.

This is one way we involve parents in our program. It sounds so simple, but it really is part of bridging the space for the children between their school and home lives.

And the songs! We have songs for every Shabbat experience you can think of, and for many you can't think of. We have songs for Shabbat with animals, for Shabbat in France and for Shabbat lights "all around the neighborhood." We have a song about greeting the "Shabbat princess"; I had been singing this song for many years before realizing it expresses the same idea as L'cha Dodi. We have silly songs that begin "Shabababababa ..." and "Gilly gilly good Shabbat." And, of course, we do sing traditional favorites like "Bim Bam."

We invite you to be part of this experience. Most adults who enter our school building are quickly drawn into the world of early childhood. Please call me if you would like to be a Shabbat guest (or an any-other-time guest). Another way you can share the ECC Shabbat experience is to join us at the JCCP on Friday evening, January 18, at 7 p.m. for our annual Early Childhood Center Shabbat service (this will be followed by the weekly 8:30 kabbalat Shabbat service). We'll have a child-friendly service led by Rabbi Weiner, a presentation by ECC children and teachers, and a gala oneg with treats made by the children. Please come! You'll be glad you did.

The Jewish Community Center of Paramus was founded in 1952 by a group of Jewish families from Paramus who saw the need for a Hebrew school for their children and a place of Jewish worship for themselves. December 8th was a very special Shabbat for the JCCP. We celebrated our 60th anniversary with a lovely Kiddush and were privileged to hear stories from three of our founding families – Fred and Lotte Buff, Henry and Lola Weber and Irene Reiss.

(Below are their speeches, which were read at Shabbat services.)

#### **FRED and LOTTE BUFF**

Shabbat Shalom. My assignment today is to take you back to 1951-1952 to envision what this town was like at the beginning, of how primitive it had to be to get started and do it in the shortest possible time. Just picture Paramus without any shopping centers — to be without home mail delivery. Instead we had to pick up our letters at a tiny post office, which was located at Century Road, after crossing the then-new Garden State Parkway. To be without private telephones we had scattered phone booths, one of which was installed in front of our house. We were expected whenever possible to answer the phone, day or night and take messages to every owner on the block.

We had to cross Route 4 or Route 17 without an overpass or traffic lights. The population of Paramus was about 3,000. We estimated that there were only about 10 Jewish families. All this changed very rapidly. New developments were built all over the town, and houses were affordable, many with GI mortgages. Within a few years, Paramus started to look like what you see today.

When our parents learned that we were about to move to New Jersey, to them it was as if we were moving abroad.

With the influx of new residents, many Jewish families also came here, mostly from New York, and from declining north Bergen towns like Jersey City, Hoboken, Paterson, etc. Most of us were ex-GIs, newly marrieds with young families. Paramus became one of the preferred communities in Bergen County.

We had met the Sobels, Fran and Al, in 1951 at the Fourth of July fireworks, which took place at the athletic field of the former Farview Public School, which is now Yavneh Academy on Farview Avenue. I vaguely remember Al from calls to my office in New York. As you know, he became president early on and Fran was the first president of our Women's Group, now Sisterhood.

Somehow, others met at PTAs, Little League, Boy or Girl Scouts, both of which were very much in vogue at that time. The need to meet new friends, preferably Jewish friends, was very evident in a new community. What we had in common was age, similar economic circumstances and young families.

In January 1952, one of the young ladies in town, her name was Emily Sobin, called Lotte to tell her about her desire to organize the Jewish community in town. She asked Lotte for help and to spread the word. She also called as many others as she could locate and had mostly positive responses. Lotte was ready but explained that she needed limited duty at the time, being six months pregnant. No problem, Emily replied, I am in the same condition. Emily became our first president. She was very capable, very enthusiastic and very organized. Unfortunately, she died very young.

After the early meetings, which were set up for "women only," husbands were invited to a first joint meeting, which was held at the Spring Valley firehouse. We met there until we outgrew the place. This incidentally was the spot where mice found our storage bins and chewed up most of our paper goods. This incident endeared the place to many of

Several meetings later, we were ready to charter this fledgling organization and to name it the Jewish Community Center of Paramus, a name we tenaciously held onto for 60 years, to this very day. Only

seven or eight of these original families still live in the area and also are still members of the JCCP.

Shortly after we got started, many others joined. Six years later we had grown to at least 130 member families, and we had lots of kids, mostly little ones. That is why their education was the No. 1 priority from the very beginning and it took little time to get a Sunday school started. Just as with our organizational efforts, the women led the way. All of our early teachers were volunteers. They imparted a very personal touch and several had prior experience in teaching religious school. Aside from that, this was all we could afford at the time. Irene Reiss was one of those volunteers and she has been involved with the school to this day.

Our first services were conducted by members. We had much talent to draw on, since most of us came from established congregations, many with traditional backgrounds. In March 1952, only two months after we got started, we celebrated Purim with our children at the Farview firehouse. About 30 youngsters were there and a photo of this event should be here on display. Our first community seder was held at the Sayre Studio. This building was replaced by the Holiday Inn on Route 17 North.

Our first Torah was "borrowed for weekends only" from Lotte's father's congregation, Beth Hillel in Washington Heights. Fridays on my way home from work I picked up the Torah, and Monday mornings on my way to work I redelivered it to my father-in-law. This continued until Sam Rosenhaus donated our first Torah, which was dedicated at the Ridgewood Avenue firehouse. This was one of our first festive occasions. Sam moved elsewhere a few years later. Luckily, we already had a portable homemade ark.

Incidentally, our first High Holiday services were held at the former Boy's Club building which stood diagonally across from our building, and where a church has since been built. During these early days, we were known as the wandering Jews of the county. We moved from firehouse to firehouse. We used them all at one time or another as we rapidly grew and we did lots of things religiously and socially. It wasn't easy at times without a permanent home and without even one staff person. Volunteers did it all. I won't even mention what our budgets were like in those days.

How many members remember the name of our first part-time rabbi? His name was Aaron Pearl, who came here for our first holiday services. This happened without a pulpit committee. He was available, as I found out from an associate of mine. He did come for an interview. I remember how upset he was when some of us were late for the interview in our house! He also endeared himself some more during the services. A period of weekend rabbis followed him, mostly students from YU.

Rabbi Rakowitz came next, and many still remember him. Early on, we had no housing for him. He stayed in private homes, including ours, during the weekends. He was young and did not mind the long walks to and from the various firehouses. He was with us for over 10 years, and got married in our new building. He even kept up friendships with several "old-timers" to this very day.

Now that we have arrived at the building, I should turn over this reading desk to my good friend Henry Weber. It was during his presidency that the first phase of the building was dedicated. Who other than he is more qualified to tell you about that? Gary Hutmacher will read Henry's story, as he and Lola are away.

One last word — if some of the dates are slightly off, or if the sequence is slightly out of kilter, remember, this all happened a long time ago. I relied heavily on Lotte's memory, as hers is better than mine.

#### **HENRY and LOLA WEBER** (read by Gary Hutmacher)

In 1952, 30 Jewish families in Paramus braved their new world to get a charter to establish the Jewish Community Center of Paramus.

In local meeting halls and private homes, they provided the basic essentials of a Jewish community. They started a Hebrew school and held appropriate Sabbath and holiday services. With boundless energy, optimism, generosity and dedication, by 1959, just seven short years later and now grown to about 200 families, they were able to establish a building fund, hire an architect, contract with a builder and set the cornerstone for the first stage of the building we now occupy.

This cornerstone, which is located in the center of our building foundation on the Midland Avenue side, contains a metal box of Center memorabilia such as a copy of the charter, a list of charter members, etc. It is intended to be removed some time in the distant future in order to examine its contents.

It is one of the proudest accomplishments of my life to have been honored to be the JCCP president during those early years from 1957 to 1959.

The new building enabled the Sisterhood (then known as the Women's Group) to mature, the Men's Club to be formed and the many other Jewish activities which we now offer so effectively to proceed.

The efforts of many people have supported and advanced the JCCP to its present respected status in the area. We are fortunate to have six surviving signers of the charter still taking an active interest in its activities. They are Lotte and Fred Buff (Fred is also a past president), Irene Reiss, Millie Reicher, and Lola and myself.

We are humble in our blessings to have been able to reach this 60th anniversary of the JCCP and only the birth of our second great-grandchild in Oregon prevents us from being here to help celebrate.

May the JCCP continue to meet the challenges which face each administration, and succeed in its ongoing effort to be a major Jewish presence in the county.

#### **IRENE REISS**

Irene was unable to get her speech to the Bulletin Committee in time for publishing, but asked us to convey this message: "I hope everyone enjoys his or her time at the center, and I hope everyone gets as much from it as I do."

#### JCCP BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING MINUTES

November 15, 2012

Joe Herrmann prepared the building prior to Hurricane Sandy and we came through in good shape. Our systems worked in terms of alarms and warnings. We did suffer in a couple of areas: the backyard of the ECC had two huge trees come down. One was uprooted and took out the fence; the other lost a huge limb and landed on one of the climbing pieces. The turf is ruined. Joe is working on getting costs to repair everything and with our insurance agent on the claim. Another problem occurred when our heat exchange pump broke and caused a smoke condition in the building.

New Milford stepped up during the power crisis. We made contingency plans about shifting our programs and services to its facility. They were very generous and accommodating. As for the merger, they have signed the term sheet, which is a "good news" milestone. Harlan Cohen's office is working on the contract. Jack Bauer and Harlan have joined the committee in charge of selling the building. We will be talking to several commercial realtors. The listing broker must be a third-party person, not someone from either congregation. The committee will decide which broker to use after meeting with all of them. Hopefully the realtor will have six months exclusivity to sell the building. Jack announced 11 committees that we will need to address and form: real estate, constitution, plaques and memorials, stained glass windows, religious, simcha, membership, finance, contract, cemetery and publicity.

The Buffs and the Webers informed us that in 1959, the congregants buried a 100-year time capsule under a headstone in

the front of the building on the Midland Avenue side. Consideration is being given now to opening the capsule and perhaps having another time capsule put in its place in connection with the merger. We discussed the upcoming 60th Anniversary Kiddush on December 8. Funding is being provided by the Golden Oldies, for which we thank them. We hope that several of our charter members will speak about the formation of the JCCP. On Sunday, December 9, we will have our annual Chanukah breakfast, and on December 11 is the Chanukah dinner and rooftop candle-lighting. There will be a small charge and RSVPs are needed.

Community Affairs reported that food banks are in dire straits. The JCCP adopted 30 families for Thanksgiving. We collected 45 turkeys and Paul Auerbach donated about half a ton of fresh fruits and vegetables. The children from the ECC came to the food truck to deliver their donations.

The Broadway Classics event was very successful. It was extremely well attended with more than 200 tickets sold. The event netted about \$4,500.

It was announced that a committee will be meeting after Thanksgiving to work on a Las Vegas Casino Night.

Fellow Congregants,

Thank you for supporting our son Daniel's Bar Mitzvah project. Thanks to you and people around the world, it was a huge success.

Daniel Max Shapiro is the grandson of Holocaust survivors. His grandfather, Seelig, was a survivor of three concentration camps, and his grandmother, Elsa, was part of the Kindertransport. With this in mind, Daniel decided to honor them both with his Bar Mitzvah project.

He set out to have a lasting legacy for his generation as well as future generations by shelving a library with books and videos about the Holocaust and the importance of religious tolerance. By addressing numerous world leaders, dignitaries, museums and institutions, he took his quest global. Using the postal service, emails, word of mouth and the local newspapers, he pursued his quest. It took him around the world and into many neighborhoods, whether by the written word or by physically going there.

Daniel received books from four continents and 13 countries in five different languages, from three presidents of the United States and a senator, Joseph Lieberman of Connecticut, who even sent him a very personal letter commending his project and what it means to be a Jew. Books came from museums that once were concentration camps and from survivors of those camps.

The Holocaust Awareness Museum and Education Center in Philadelphia and the Nassau County Holocaust Museum on Long Island invited him to their museums to receive numerous books and posters, and to meet survivors face to face. He took them up on their offers.

Many congregants from the JCC of Paramus also made donations. Some of the books he received there were authored by congregants there. All the books have equal importance to his project, but the ones from the JCCP are personal.

Still, some of the respondents that did not send books are also worth mentioning. They include the secretary-general of the United Nations, Ban Ki-moon; the queen of England; and His Holiness, Pope Benedict XVI. The pope, however, did "invoke an abundance of divine blessings." Not bad for a Jewish kid!

Following his visit to the museums, Daniel has tried to go in a new direction. Every year in public school since third grade, his class has had to read and discuss a novel about the Holocaust. Daniel asked one of his teachers if the students could read a biography by one of the survivors he met, then he would arrange to have the person visit the school and address his classmates. This remains a work in progress.

Recently he brought nearly 200 books to Montclair State University for its library. Ron Hollander at the school was most gracious and appreciative to receive them. He had Daniel address the class, then offered him an open invitation to sit in on any of his classes.

We are all very proud of Daniel and what he has achieved, and we hope he is equally proud of himself. (We are still accepting books; they can be sent to the JCC of Paramus.)


