SHAVUOT TORAH TEACH-IN

TUESDAY, JUNE 3 • 8 P.M.

Shavuot is called "the time of the giving of the Torah." Shavuot evening has always been dedicated to the study of the Torah and other great works of the Jewish tradition. This tradition of study in honor of Shavuot is referred to as *TIKKUN LEL SHAVUOT*.

This year we are changing the format of our annual Tikkun Lel Shavuot-Shavuot Torah Teach-In to include as many members of the congregation as possible.

Traditionally, on the first night of Shavuot, Jews throughout the world gather and study Torah together from night till the early morning hours. **But this year we are going to start a little early!**

- 1. At 6 p.m. Tuesday, June 3, there will be a special pre-Shavuot program for our Hebrew School and day school families.** Following a dairy dinner, Rabbi Weiner and Marcia Kagedan will lead a family learning session titled "What is the Torah?" As part of the program, the Torah will be unrolled and explained in front of the community. Come with your questions. This part of the program will conclude at 7:30 with ice cream for all.
- 2. Immediately following the Minchah service at 8 p.m., we will have our first learning session for the entire community.** We know that not everyone can stay all night, but we encourage you to participate in this earlier opportunity. Several options for classes will be offered and you may choose the one that interests you the most.
- 3. Following the Maariv service at 9:15 p.m., we will sit together (at until least midnight, if not longer), enjoy Yom Tov delicacies and study Torah with Rabbi Weiner and Cantor Weiss along with other members of the congregation.** There will be several classes and options from which to choose; the information about the options for classes will be publicized that night.

Come and enjoy this inspiring, lively afternoon/evening of Torah study. It will be an exciting, enriching event for all.

From the Rabbi



Rabbi Arthur D. Weiner

I came across something recently that gave me a great deal of hope. I spoke about it briefly on Passover, but it contains a truth that deserves a wider audience.

As is well known, there are often major tensions in Israel between the secular and "ultra-Orthodox" communities. The tensions have a lot to do with the perceived power of the ultra-Orthodox community (also known as the *Haredim*) on the national and local level. Among the issues that divide the communities are funding for the various school options in Israel, the place of religion in Israeli life, and service in Israel's military.

These issues have received a great deal of attention in the Israeli and American media in recent months. These are serious issues. I have always believed that these tensions are a danger to Israeli society. I witnessed it on my first trip to Israel in 1978, and since then it seems to have grown much worse. With the increase in the ultra-Orthodox population, the difficult decisions about allocating Israel's scarce resources have often led to hard lines being drawn between the communities with very few opportunities for dialogue and the fostering of relationships. Certain irresponsible politicians and public figures have inflamed the situation by making unfounded and untrue allegations about the motives and actions of the "other side."

So I was delighted to read an article published right before Passover in the ultra-Orthodox newspaper *Mishpacha* (The Family) titled "NEW POLL SHOCKS HAREDIM, FINDS SECULAR ISRAELIS DO NOT HATE

HAREDIM AND DO NOT WANT TO PERSECUTE THEM."

The newspaper sponsored a poll to determine the attitudes of secular Israelis toward the Haredim and hired one of Israel's premier pollsters to conduct it. And what they found shocked them.

Here are some results of the poll:

- 72% of secular Israelis believe that the Haredim do not contribute to the Jewish nature of Israel.
- 67% believe that the Israel Defense Forces is obligated to provide Haredim who serve with all of their religious needs to make sure that their lifestyle is not impacted negatively by their army service.
- 82% are willing to hire Haredim to work in their companies.
- 93% believe that there must be dialogue between the secular and Haredim to preserve unity in Israeli society.
- 52% feel that Haredim and secular living side by side in the same areas will lead to better relationships between these populations.
- 77% know Haredim personally and 83% have a favorable outlook toward the Haredim who they do know.
- Among those who live in neighborhoods with Haredim, 77% say that the Haredim do not disturb their lives in any way.
- 91% want to make sure that Israel preserves its Jewish identity, 89% believe that Israeli children must be familiar with Jewish tradition, and 50% feel that the education system is not doing enough to preserve these beliefs.
- 92% have a mezuzah on their front doors.

Rabbi Moshe Gorelik, the editor of *Mishpacha* and a media personality who has long participated in spreading mistrust of the secular community, wrote the following in response:

"To admit the truth, we were stunned. If this poll is correct, we have been living all the time with a mistake. We were sure that the average secular Israeli despised us. Not only that, but we in the Haredi media in partnership with the Haredi politicians, spread this feeling and spoke about it over and over, all the time. And behold, this beautiful structure falls apart. Behold, it has become clear that the

truth is different: Most and close to all don't hate. ... What does this say to us and about us? Why are we not a source of inspiration ... We must change approaches and the way we look at one another. We must stop fortifying ourselves behind mistaken walls and change paths."

Think about what Rabbi Gorelik is saying. That in the face of this evidence, he stopped and realized that he had been wrong and was willing to say so publicly, in hopes of effecting some healing and transformation in Israeli society. It could not have been easy for him to do so. Many people have a lot invested in the alleged discord. I am inspired by that.

But we must be more than inspired. I actually hope such a story motivates us to rethink our "orthodoxies," our deeply held beliefs that upon consideration don't really reflect our beliefs or some objective truth. Let's ask ourselves instead: How can we spread more love, more compassion, and more understanding. How can we be better Jewish role models for our families and our communities? How can we share more of our talents and passions for the betterment of our synagogue and community?

In a sense, that is the challenge Rabbi Gorelik is posing to those who look to him for leadership and wisdom. I want to challenge our community to do no less.

JCCP/CBT BOARD OF TRUSTEES MINUTES

March 20, 2014

GOOD AND WELFARE

Jack Bauer thanked David Luria, Arnie Brown, Arthur Abrams, Rabbi Weiner and Shira for a delightful Passover seder. Joe Esrig wished Ken Glatzer a happy birthday. Beth Chananie wished a Mazel Tov to Sue and Mitch Greenberg on the birth of their daughter's new baby. Paul Auerbach announced that a very nice article was written about his son's artwork in *The Jewish Standard*.

Harlan announced that the money from the pushka tonight will go to the Center for Food Action. Roz Gerard added that the Fran Leib Spring Turkey Drive collected 18 turkeys, 45 bags of groceries and \$875 in gift cards and cash.

Harlan read a letter sent to Rabbi Weiner from the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee thanking us for the \$500 donation to help the Jews in Ukraine. Rabbi added that to date we have raised over \$2,200 for this cause.

There were no comments or questions from members during the open comment period.

Harvey reported that the current membership count is 472 – we added one new member.

Last month, Harvey attended an Office of Homeland Security workshop that was specific to religious organizations, where they discussed threat recognition and identification, establishing practices, staff training, etc.

Earlier in March, Harvey attended a conference in Canada that outlined development and fundraising models which we can incorporate ourselves. Harvey will share these models with the board and the Fundraising Committee over the next few months.

We will install a temporary membrane on the roof that will buy us some time to assess how/what we need to do to permanently repair the leaks.

A new round of funding is available through Homeland Security grants, and Harvey will submit the applications by the due date. We will be asking for supplemental items to what was approved in the last grant.

We sold a large number of graves prior to the price increase, exceeding our budget by \$13,000.

We have been approached by the Bergen County Department of Children and Families for a summer rental from July 7 through the end of August. The request is under review by the state. In addition, two other church groups are looking for daily and weekly worship space.

We have had an uptick in individual party rentals: 15 inquiries and four booked events.

Ongoing expense control has reduced or eliminated overtime for the custodial staff. One maintenance person resigned as a result.

All purchasing will come through the main office so we can aggregate orders and negotiate better prices.

The Building Committee asked Harvey to report that it discussed

the installation of New Milford's stained glass windows in the Social Hall with two studios and a general contractor. The installation will be completed by James E. Van Wie Hiemer & Company Stained Glass Studios. The windows will be picked up next week and sized for our space.

Harvey will reach out to the Paramus Police Department to see if it can give us some training/guidance on how to handle an emergency situation. He will also look into a lockdown procedure for the Hebrew school.

Sale of property: A committee headed by Shawn Rabban is meeting, put up For Sale signs and ran ads in several papers last week. We have received about 20 calls but no written offers. The selling price is \$2.2 million. The next step will be to hire a broker.

Rental to replace Palisades: We recently signed an agreement with Jeff Kolodkin of Newmark Realty – nine months with a 30-day cancellation notice at a commission of 2½%. Newmark Realty has reached out to religious organizations, the Korean community and brokers who work with schools. Yavneh of Paramus and Rosenbaum Yeshiva of River Edge are looking for short-term rentals while they renovate their facilities. We are on multiple listing services and mass mailings.

Howie Leopold has received a lot of feedback from the pre-Passover phone calls from board members to members, mostly positive. He will contact the appropriate people to address the feedback that needs follow-up.

A motion passed authorizing the expenditure of up to \$6,000 to upgrade the wiring and hardware to the Hebrew School office and set up a WiFi network to the entire building.

Sandy Alpern presented the list of nominees for officers and trustees. The only spot that has not been filled is recording secretary.

Harlan thanked Sandy, who stepped up under adverse circumstances and, together with her committee, persevered to get the job done despite the obstacles they faced.

A letter to the congregation went out informing everyone of the situation with Palisades and announcing town hall meetings on April 27 and May 7.

Wayne Zeiler presented on behalf of the Financial and Budget Oversight Committee. As there are many issues to address, the committee has broken them down into smaller parts rather than addressing everything at once. Wayne made a presentation covering four areas.

1. Accountability: A roll-up structure will be instituted. All VPs will be assigned areas to oversee and attend their meetings. We will institute pre-approval for all spending above a set limit, which means we will establish a purchase order system that will allow us to understand costs as they occur and ensure we stay within our budgets. Any reimbursements need to be signed by the committee chair and VP in charge of that group. The cost threshold for instituting this system has not yet been decided.

2. Cost Containment: We will consolidate all bank accounts, including Sisterhood, Men's Club and APT. We will evaluate our insurance rates (benefits and building) and ensure we are getting the best rates. We will look at contractual agreements and decide whether continuing to support 100% of coverage expenses for our employees is appropriate.

3. Revenue: Caterers are moving away from Temple alliances, but we will research whether multiple caterers can use our kitchen and other spaces. A dues increase has been tabled for

now but will be revisited in connection with the budget for the fiscal year that starts on July 1.

4. Other: Two town hall sessions have been set up. We should address whether to set up three town hall-type meetings every year. We need to establish a marketing committee to improve our internal and external communication. We need to get a membership list that outlines everyone's profession so we can have this information at our fingertips. Any contract must be signed by the president or an agent for the president in accordance with our Constitution.

Harriet announced that budget numbers must be submitted to the Finance Committee by May 1, so the budget can be prepared on time.

Bob Nesoff reported that the former CBT has 15-18 cemetery plots. He suggested that at the end of the calendar year, instead of keeping these plots separate and exclusive to CBT members, we open them to the JCCP/CBT membership. Harlan suggested that Bob reach out to former CBT members and get everyone's agreement to merge the two sections.

The three-month trial for open board meetings is completed. The board consensus was to temporarily extend this policy to next month, at which time the board will decide whether to make open meetings a permanent part of board meetings.
