From the Rabbi

The Public Religion Research Institute recently released *Chosen for What? Jewish Values in 2012*, an important study of the voting patterns and political leanings of the American Jewish community, as well as the influence of distinctive Jewish values on their political decision-making. This fascinating study is sure to be of great interest to sociologists, historians and others who engage in the exploration of such subjects, as well as rabbis, teachers, communal leaders and all those who want to better understand the choices made by American Jews.

The study, which I have been reading with great interest, has confirmed some of my observations of the Jewish community based on my years of service while providing a new perspective on other issues that I had never really considered in the past. I have no doubt that in the months to come there will be much reflection on its data, as well as many voices who will attempt to interpret its meaning. (I also anticipate several sermons, but that is for another time.)

So what are some of insights revealed by the study? Among some of the more significant conclusions:

- At least 8 in 10 American Jews say that pursuing justice (84%) and caring for the widow and the orphan (80%) are somewhat

or very important values that inform their political beliefs and activity.

- More than 8 in 10 Jews say that the experiences of the Holocaust (87%) and having opportunities for economic success in America (85%) are somewhat or very important for informing their political beliefs and activity.
- Eight months before the 2012 election, 62% of Jewish voters say they would like to see President Obama re-elected — more than twice the number who say they would prefer that a Republican victory (30%).
- Support for President Obama among Jewish voters is significantly higher than the general population and nearly identical to levels of support for Obama among Jewish registered voters at a comparable point in the 2008 campaign.
- Among Jewish voters who prefer that a Republican candidate win the 2012 election, Mitt Romney has the greatest support (58%), followed by Rick Santorum (15%), Newt Gingrich (13%) and Ron Paul (12%).
- Among Jewish voters who say they supported Barack Obama in 2008, an overwhelming majority (86%) say they would like to see the president re-elected; only 7% of Jewish voters who supported Obama in 2008 say they would prefer to see a Republican candidate win in November.
- Jewish voters who supported John McCain in 2008 demonstrate similar loyalty in their voting preferences, with 92% reporting that they would prefer that a Republican candidate win the election.
- A majority (54%) of American Jews say that relations between Israel and the U.S. are about the same as they have been in the past, while 7% say they are better and 37% say they are worse.

When compared with the American public at large, American Jews are:

- **More** likely to view President Obama favorably (61% to 52%).
- **Less** likely to believe that the “American dream” still holds true (37% to 44%).
- **More** likely to support raising taxes on those earning more than \$1 million per year (58% to 43%), as well as **more** likely to disagree that people have become too dependent on government assistance programs (45% to 22%).
- **Slightly more** likely to support American military action to prevent Iran’s nuclear weapons program (59% to 50%).
- **Significantly more** likely to support abortion rights (93% to 44%) and gay marriage (81% to 44%).

From my point of view as a rabbi who is committed to the teaching and practice of Jewish beliefs and

observances, the study also contained some great disappointments. According to the study, when compared with the American public at large, American Jews are:

- **Less** likely than the national average to view religion as important (59% to 80%).
- **Four times less** likely to view Judaism as the most important thing in their lives.
- **Three times more likely** to deny the existence of God.

“Chosen for What? Jewish Values in 2012” paints a complex portrait of the American Jewish community. But it challenges us: How does our Judaism influence the choices we make and our hopes for this great nation?

President's Message

At the end of March, my family traveled to Paris to meet the family of my daughter's fiancé's and to celebrate their upcoming wedding with a traditional Sephardic engagement party. This happened to coincide with the tragic events in Toulouse. At the end of Friday night Shabbat services, the father of the bride was asked to address the congregation, and after an awkward attempt to do so in French, I reverted to my native tongue (ably translated by their rabbi) and discussed what our two communities had in common.

Anti-Semitism affects us all, whether we live in Chicago, New York, Paramus, Paris or Big Fork, Minn. (more on that later). Later, at the oneg, I met with the deputy mayor of this Paramus-sized suburb of Paris, who was a member of the synagogue of my future son-in-law's family. I told him that our synagogue had recently been a target of anti-Semitic arsonists and how close we came to suffering serious damage. He expressed surprise that something like this could happen these days so close to New York City. Later, as we left the synagogue, he warned us not to stand and hang around outside the building wearing our kipot for fear of bringing attention to the location and presenting a larger target for any possible terrorist attack.

This reminded me of my first real encounter with anti-Semitism. Growing up in Teaneck, I was somewhat insulated from hostility, surrounded by a sizable Jewish population. However, during college, I found myself living in Big Fork

for a semester, a small town near the Canadian border, where I was studying wolf biology. Big Fork reminded me of a frontier town, with a gas station, plenty of taverns and fishing lodges, where moose and beaver were a more common sight than gray squirrels.

The couple I rented my small cabin from originally were from Chicago and were kind, hospitable people. In December, I received a care package from the JCC of Teaneck containing a menorah and Chanukah candles. When I went to pick up my mail at the lodge/tavern, they collectively handed me the package and looked at me part quizzically and part suspiciously (OK, it WAS during my long-haired college phase, but they accepted that. They already thought I was screwy living up there chasing after wolves.) They simply asked me, "You a Jew?" When I said yes, the husband came up to me and began rubbing my head, looking for my horns (hidden by my long hair?). I kid you not. He expected to see Michelangelo-style horns or at least stumps where I may have had them removed. After that, my close relationship with them was changed. I was no longer the crazy kid from Jersey following wolves; now I was simply the Jew. Conversations changed. Whispering became more commonplace when I came in to order dinner several times a week. Although by appearances my jeans, work shirt, and boots resembled theirs, I suddenly stuck out like a sore thumb after that early December day.

Anti-Semitism thrives on ignorance. It is fuel for the fires of hatred and bigotry of all types. We can never assume that we have outgrown or overcome religious intolerance just because we're in the 21st century and seemingly have moved far from the '60s. Parents and teachers need to stay vigilant and teach about intolerance in all its forms, whether it is about bullying, religion, gender preference, etc. We need to teach and remind our children that intolerance can begin very innocently in the schoolyard, classroom, or in a fishing lodge in northern Minnesota, and should be condemned and fought wherever and whenever it may appear.

Early Childhood Center News

A misty March morning ... three early childhood classes ... a truck ... some cans of food ...and a lot of disgusting litter...

What a recipe for a spectacular learning experience!

We had made plans to participate in the JCCP's Pesach food drive by asking each child bring some food to donate, and then to walk from the ECC to the parking lot to place food in the truck from the Center for Food Action. This is a great example of a hands-on (and feet-on) learning experience, well integrated into our Judaic curriculum and the concept of tzedakah. This was actually the third time we tried to do this; twice previously it had rained, and Jimmie, the truck driver, had kindly driven over to the ECC.

As it happened, a few days earlier, a visit with our Nature specialist had devolved into a lesson on "what belongs in Nature" and what doesn't, and the children had picked up a lot of litter around the ECC.

The morning of the food drive it was foggy and drizzly, but we decided to brave the weather and take the walk. Each child carried a can, box, or bag of food to donate. We could see the truck and the people waiting for us in the parking lot, and we waved to them as we walked. Some of the teachers and children sang a song about

marching out of Egypt as they walked. On the way, we noticed that there was quite a bit of litter on the grass and in the stream.

In the parking lot, members of the JCCP Community Affairs Committee welcomed the children and, with Jimmie, helped them place their donations in the truck. The teachers, committee members, and I reminded the children that hungry people would be able to eat because WE had brought food.

Walking back, I asked the Pre-K and Threes children to each pick up a piece of trash or two and put it in my bag, removing things that don't belong in Nature. (They washed their hands well when they got back to school!) Two 5-year-olds and I lingered on the bridge looking at the well-littered stream and discussing what we would remove — if we could only get down there! (For anyone who would like to clear the stream near the south side of Midland Avenue, there were Coke cans, empty cups, and assorted paper plates, plastic bags, and more! Bring waders, gloves and a garbage bag!)

As the children filtered into the ECC building, I again made a general remark that people who did not have enough to eat would be able to eat what we had brought. One little boy remarked, "But Morah Judy, the people won't know that the food is from us!"

"You're right, they won't," I replied, "but what matters is that they will have food to eat."

Of course, the concept is beyond this 3-year-old, but he had just tapped into Maimonides' ladder of tzedakah, with its eight levels of giving!

True tzedakah — cleaning the environment, making the Community Affairs people very happy, and walking together in the clearing morning air — I cannot think of a better way for the ECC to spend half an hour!

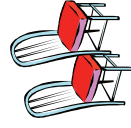
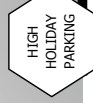

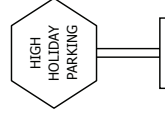
