SHAVUOT TORAH TEACH-IN SATURDAY, MAY 23 • 8 P.M.

Shavuot is called "the time of the giving of the Torah." Shavuot evening has always been dedicated to the study of the Torah and other great works of the Jewish tradition. This tradition of study in honor of Shavuot is referred to as *Tikkun Lel Shavuot*.

We are again changing the format of our annual *Tikkun Lel Shavuot*-Shavuot Torah Teach-In to include as many members of the congregation as possible..

Traditionally, on the first night of Shavuot, Jews throughout the world gather and study Torah together from the night till the early morning hours. **But this year, we are going to start a little early!**

1. Immediately following the Minchah service at 8 p.m., we will have our first learning session for the entire community. We know that not everyone can stay all night, but we encourage you to participate in this earlier opportunity. Several options for classes will be offered and you may choose the one that interests you the most.

2. Following the Maariv service at 9 p.m., we will sit together (at least until midnight, if not longer), enjoy Yom Tov delicacies, and study Torah with Rabbi Weiner and Cantor Weiss, and other members of the congregation. There again will be several classes and options from which to choose. More information about the options for classes will be publicized that night.

Come and enjoy this inspiring, lively evening of Torah study. It will be an exciting, enriching event for all.

A Post-Passover Message

I did something this past Passover (no pun intended!) that I have not done in many years: I went Passover shopping with my wife.

It's not that I am above such activities; far from it. The truth is that I just don't go along. My wife accomplishes her tasks far more efficiently, and with less advice, when I do not participate. My role is restricted to helping her bring in the groceries from the car when she returns. In fact, because I spend so much time asking her if "we really need all these things," I'm thinking she prefers to do everything by herself.

So it has been a while since I have done any hard-core Passover shopping. (Of course, here and there I'll run out and pick up some things.) And where did we go but the Jerusalem of Passover shopping: Monsey, New York. Rockland County in general, and the Monsey/Spring Valley area, is to kosher food what Paris and Milan is to the fashion industry. Everything you can imagine for the kosher consumer, for Passover or at any time, can be found there. And if you have a new product, it is *the* place to showcase it.

We are a little spoiled living in Bergen County, one of the largest and most vibrant Jewish communities in all of North America. Between ShopRite, Fairway, and the specialty stores in Teaneck, we truly lack for nothing. But the amount and variety of kosher-for-Passover products in Monsey is exponentially greater.

Many of you remember when it was difficult to buy most products during this season. For many years there was matzah, some Manischewitz cookies and gefilte fish, and lots of meat, potatoes, and vegetables. There was very little in the way of dairy products and not much variety in packaged foods. Yet we all survived. Now you can find varieties of matzah to accommodate special diets (like gluten-free), fads, and trends in the food industry.

Growing up on Long Island, I can remember how a line of cars a half-mile long formed around a local Dairy Barn convenience store over the rumor – which turned out to be true – that it had kosher for Passover ice cream. I know because I was the one who insisted to my father, of blessed memory, that we needed to be there to behold this miraculous event.

But something else became kosher for Passover this year – something far less fun and far more threatening to the health and welfare in the future of the Jewish people. And we better be ready to work to rid ourselves of it with the same fervor that we worked to remove chametz from our homes.

I'm talking about the bitter mood and atmosphere, and words and rhetoric, emanating from recent events in Israel and their impact on the wider Jewish world. I'm talking about the bitter debate that has emerged among the various segments of the pro-Israel community in America in the aftermath of Prime Minister Netanyahu's speech in Washington in March, and his recent reelection in Israel.

I'm talking about an emerging Jewish culture which basically says that your love for Israel must be mediated through your view of American politics, where Jewish Democrats and Jewish Republicans fail to see the merits in the opinions – or even worse, will not even listen to the views of the other, they are so blinded by their own beliefs and fears.

I'm talking about an election in Israel where each of the major parties has basically written off those who disagree with them, or

that cast aspersions over the loyalty and patriotism of their opponents. Where Jews on the right side of the political spectrum demonized Israel's Arab minorities, then, when caught red-handed, tried to justify and contextualize their hurtful and sinful words and rhetoric. And perhaps worst of all, knowing the whole time that this horrendous tactic actually worked. Yes, it worked.

I'm talking about an inability to see hope and decency and righteousness and love of Israel, and love of the Jewish people in others because they have a differing political philosophy.

I'm talking about an alienation and a weariness among people who have devoted their lives and careers and their resources for the Jewish community, for the safety of Israel. I'm talking about leaders who are being cast aside because they had the courage to articulate a view that is critical of the prevailing attitudes among some of Israel's supporters. People, and yes, I include myself among such

people, who understand that Israel's real strength is in its democratic values, its deep ties to the Western world, and the perception that it truly seeks peace with its neighbors. Values that have been challenged by the reckless behavior of not only the current Israeli leadership, but the increasing numbers of its supporters throughout the world who seem to believe that Israel should not only exist as an armed Sparta, but actually relish the thought of it.

As I wandered the aisles of the stores in Monsey before Passover, spending crazy amounts of money on all kinds of Passover goodies, I couldn't help but think of all we have achieved by using our freedoms wisely in the past two generations.

Now that Passover has ended, let's think about all we have built and how much we are endangering our future if we continue on the current path. As we go forward, let us use more responsibly the very freedom that we so deeply considered on Passover.

Among the goals of the Nazi campaign during World War II was the attempt by Hitler to steal some of the greatest artistic works of Western civilization. In 1943, President Roosevelt authorized the formation of the Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives section, a small group of elite volunteers who were charged with recovering these masterpieces, and in a way preventing Hitler from stealing a people's past despite having denied so many their futures. These individuals came to be known as the Monuments Men.

Last year, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Monuments Men Recognition Act, which awarded the participants a Congressional Gold Medal. Today, only one member of this extraordinary group is still alive, and the Men's Club of The Jewish Community of Paramus/Congregation Beth Tikvah is proud to present Harry Ettlinger in our synagogue, up close and in person.

President's Message

March and April were very positive months in our shul.

To begin, I would like to thank Arthur Abrams, Arnie Brown and David Luria for again chairing the Community Seder, which was a great success. I would be remiss if I did not thank Shira Weiner for preparing the desserts.

My May Congregant of the month is Bob Grotsky. Besides being a mainstay in the Egalitarian Service, Bob regularly reads the Torah during the service.

Bob, thank you.

The roof on our entire building has been replaced. For the first time since I have been a member, we don't have to worry about leaks when it rains or see pails in the hallway and classrooms to catch dripping water. In addition, we have replaced all our drains and repaired our chimney.

As part of the Homeland Security Grant given to us, we have installed a new security system, which enables us through the positioning of 16 cameras to visually monitor our entire property at all times. Panic buttons have also been strategically installed in the sanctuary, and in the main and school offices.

We have agreed to have the air conditioner above the gym and every non-energy efficient fixture in the building replaced by a New Jersey-sponsored incentive program that is estimated to save us in excess of \$27,000 per year. The savings will pay for the new equipment in just over a year.

I am waiting for additional items that may be covered by this program. If this materializes, much of our infrastructure will be replaced in less than year at a savings that none of us dreamt of a year ago.

We will have a special speaker on Sunday, May 17: Harry Ettinger, the last living member of the Monuments Men, will be here to tell us his story of saving art from the Nazis during World War II.

Join us and thousands of others on Sunday, May 31, as we walk up Fifth Avenue in New York waving the Israeli flag in the Celebrate Israel Parade.

Finally, now is the time to get your ads for our 33rd annual Ad Journal Dinner Dance. It will be held on Sunday, June 14, and we will be honoring Randy and Paul Auerbach and Nina and Russell Rothman. The ad deadline is May 7.

YUMMY POUND CAKE

Finally, spring is here! What a long and grueling winter. I saw this recipe for pound cake and thought it would please the JCCP/CBT readers. Feel free to add strawberries or ice cream when serving. This is not a low calorie cake, so eat it in moderation, like everything else.

Ingredients:

1/2 pound butter

3 cups sugar

6 eggs

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

1 teaspoon lemon extract

3 cups sifted cake flour

1/4 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 pint sour cream



Preparation:

Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing well with a beater. Add flavorings. Sift the flour with baking soda, and add it alternately with sour cream to the mixture. Spray a Bundt pan with Pam or grease and flour. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Check to make sure a toothpick comes out clean to know that the cake is baked.

Youth Group News

As we end the third year as Youth co-chairs, we wanted to take a few minutes to reflect on our tenure in the position. When you begin any new task or challenge, typically there is a feeling of nervousness about the job you will perform and the impact you will make; we were no different. We knew that our daughter Gab and her friend Rebecca were going to be the next co-presidents, and our younger daughter Bec and her friends were looking to become involved. We knew that by "stepping up," we would be supporting and helping our children and their friends, as well as teenagers that we didn't know.

Three years ago it looked like our Youth program was going to fade away. Our daughters went to work and invited their friends to join. The challenge was simple – most kids, and their parents, saw our programs as an extension of the religious aspects of our shul. With Gab and Bec soliciting friends, it became clear that this was a "club" for Jewish socialization. Yes, we ran one service a year; yes, we had some religious aspects. However, the environment mostly was one to hang out with existing friends, be introduced to new ones and meet people from other towns. By providing a bus to regional dances, we were able to join with the surrounding youth groups to travel together.

We were excited to catch the eyes of Hagalil, the organization that runs the USY/Kadima programs. Within one calendar year we were able to host a successful regional dance, in March 2014, with about 110 teens, followed by a highly successful convention in November that year attended by over 200 teens. The convention was a success not only for the USY and the region, but for also having members of our congregation pull together to house, chaperone, serve, and support the big event. As the African proverb so adroitly explained it, "It takes a village to raise a child."

We could not have accomplished the activities, fundraising and coordination without the help of our fellow committee members. Many decisions were done and directions were charted as a group, always with the benefits of our kids in mind, sometimes for the broader community and occasionally for ourselves (we get to socialize, too). Along with the committee, we have worked with several advisers over the years – Matt and Alexa, Gabe, Danielle, and Fred. Each of them has been trusted with the care of our children, planning and overseeing the activities and making sure everyone is safe and having a good time.

It has been a great three years!

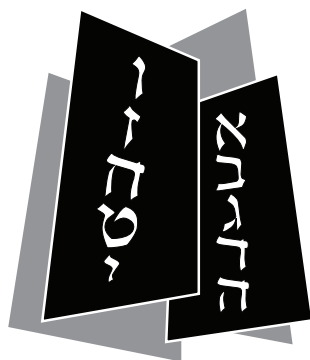

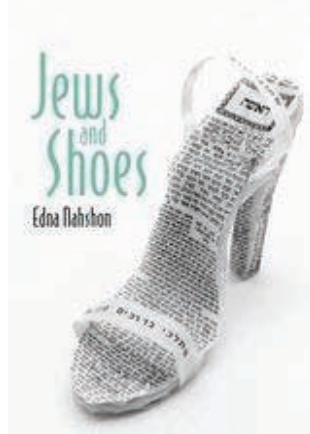

We're also trying to get our stomachs back in order after two festive meals and lots of Manischewitz products in all shapes and sizes. Hopefully, by now the dishes, silverware and the many, many bowls have been wrapped up and are back in storage.

We hope that everyone had a meaningful Pesach, and there was joy and reason for celebration at your seder tables. Many of our members celebrated at the synagogue's communal seder; how wonderful it was to be together in our home away from home. In addition to recalling the story of Pesach at our seder tables, consciously or not we acknowledge how fortunate we are to have family and/or friends to be with, and how being in a community during Pesach is such a critical piece of the holiday experience.

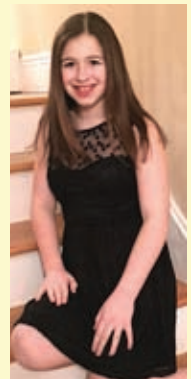

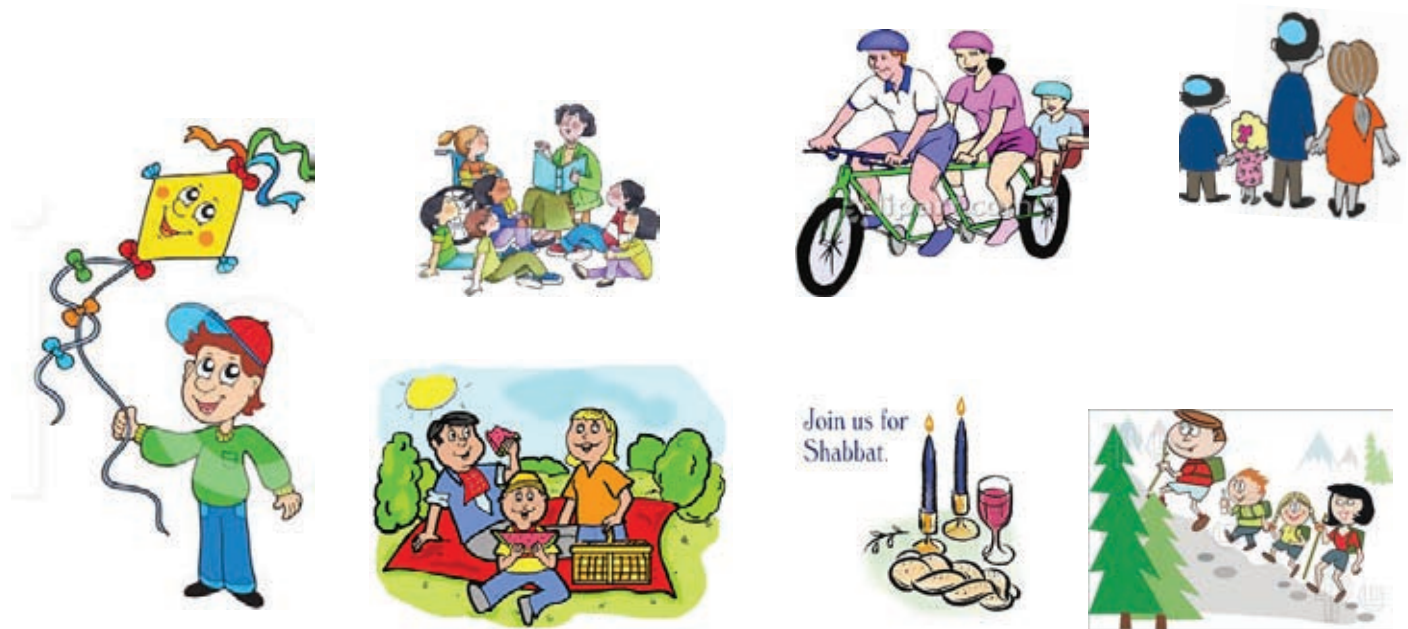

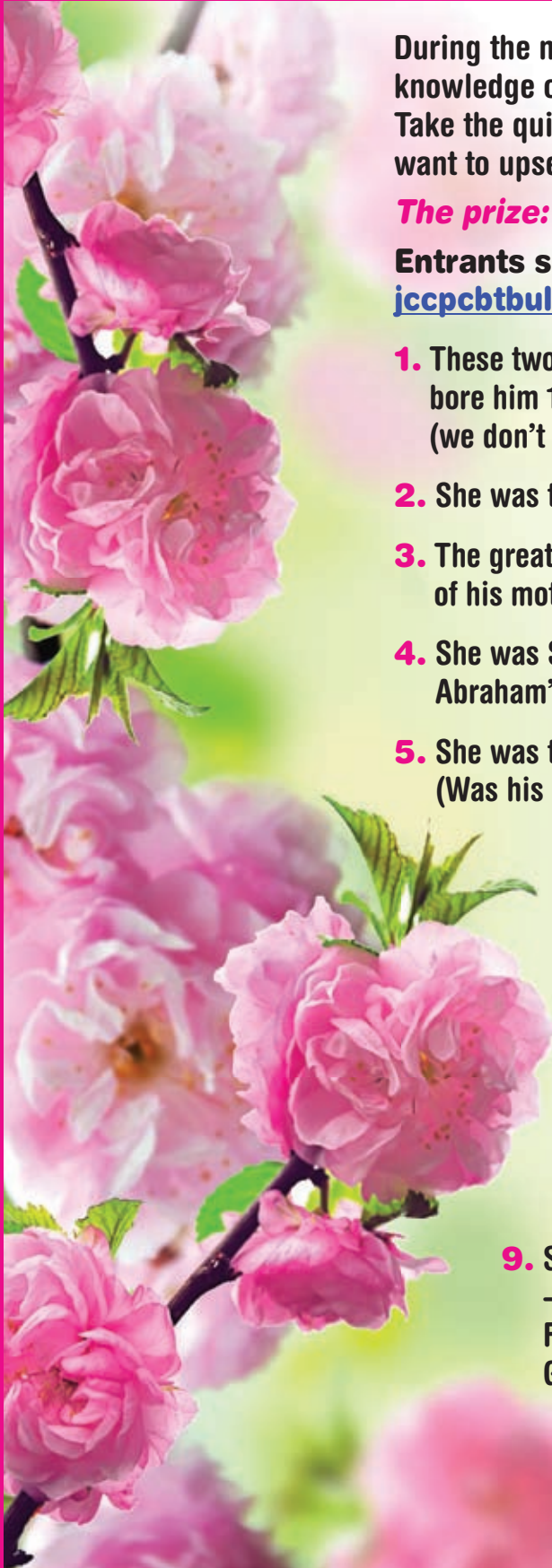
