# From the Rabbi

I As I studied the weekly Torah reading of Parshat Noah and the epic story of the flood (and simultaneously worked toward meeting the deadline for the Bulletin), I thought about something I had not ever given much thought to.

Was Noah Jewish? Is that even important?

Let me start by saying that at least a few times a year, I try to address the tension between the more universal themes of Judaism and its more particular visions. You may recall that I have spoken about this during High Holidays and Shabbat sermons, and written about this extensively. What of our precious resources must be devoted to securing the specific and particular interests of the Jewish community? And when must our focus and reach extend beyond?

Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah - all Jewish. But they, like us, do not exist in a vacuum. And that is why non-Jews, like Noah, play important roles throughout the Bible. And we learn from them! The Bible implies it and our rabbis make it explicit. While we must take care of our own needs, it is no mitzvah to ignore or fail to learn from non-Jews. Indeed, we ignore this lesson at our peril.

Have you ever heard of Arianna Grande? At 22, she is one of the biggest acts on the pop music scene right now. Raised as a Catholic, in a recent interview with the Jewish Forward she attributed

much of her success, and her ability to withstand - at least thus far - so many of the difficulties associated with superstardom at such a young age to her study of and devotion to, of all things - Kabbalah, the Jewish mystical tradition! Kabbalah may not be a particularly big part of the consciousness of most American Jews, but nonetheless it has been embraced by so many Hollywood types, like Madonna, Ashton Kutscher and others. That is to say, they see great wisdom in Kabbalah and have appropriated some of it for their own needs and purposes. They acknowledge its source and are not threatened by it.

Many non-Jews are finding wisdom in our teachings and traditions. Do you know that traditional Jewish symbols like wedding ketubahs, and chuppahs are becoming common at the weddings of non-Jewish couples? We're not talking about intermarriages, where each party is trying to bring or blend some aspect of their personal tradition with their future spouse. It's something different. It's people finding beauty and wisdom in traditional Jewish customs or observances and making them their own, without regard to its source or origins.

The Jewish world is still reeling from the scandal involving Rabbi Barry Freundel, the prominent rabbi in Washington convicted of installing a secret camera in the mikvah associated with his congregation. He was sentenced recently to prison for his crimes. The way his congregation responded to this crisis was noteworthy, quickly cutting ties with the rabbi even though he had led the community for over 25 years and was a leading voice in the world of modern Orthodoxy. Freundel was also banned from the synagogue pending the outcome of the legal process. What the synagogue did was throw its weight, prestige and resources toward the victims of this crime. Now this might not seem so innovative, but even five or 10 years ago this would not have happened. The synagogue likely

would have thrown its weight behind a vigorous defense of its rabbi's innocence like any other religious institution in America that has faced similar scandal until recently. But the synagogue was sensitive to and learned from the greater pool of wisdom about how to handle these situations, and the source of this wisdom was not the Torah, Talmud or rabbis, for our tradition tells us nothing about how to handle a scandal like this. But by going outside of our glorious heritage, Freundel's congregation gained the insight and the wisdom to do the right thing.

Our rabbis ask: Who is a wise person? The one who learns from all people. The real question for us to consider early in the new year is not whether Noah was Jewish, but rather what we can learn from him and the biblical story about his life and struggles. Just as we are fortunate to live in a time when there are so many who are gaining strength and insight that improves their lives from our Jewish tradition, let us similarly learn to find the right balance between devotion to our own heritage, and openness to the wisdom of others.

### From the Executive Director

What does it mean to be a member of a synagogue? Most people's first response would be "pay dues." After all, like membership in a country club, trade association or union, once you pay your dues, you're "in." Not much else is asked of you; you don't even need to attend.

Membership in a religious institution, however, means something else. The point of belonging to a religious community like a synagogue is not to be able to get a good tee time or first access to a new show. The point isn't even having a place to enjoy an elaborate kiddish - although it doesn't hurt.

A synagogue exists to do two fundamental things: call us to be our better selves and then help us get there. As involved Jews, we believe in improving the quality of our lives, in personal growth, in curbing our appetites for more toys and frills. The din of our secular culture can only get turned off, or at least lowered, when we come together as a kehillah - an enlightened, sacred community - and take seriously our desire for something spiritual and meaningful in our lives.

Often we see our tradition as a stone that keeps us tethered to the ground instead of as wings meant to lift us toward our higher ideals. Many people tend to disparage the importance of membership in a synagogue community because we "don't believe in that stuff." Yet I suspect that most of us are motivated more by the need to live lives of integrity than by the desire for heaven or the fear of hell. Hell isn't even a Jewish concept!

The physicist Thomas Campbell wrote that the quality of one's life is the product of "evolving your being, increasing your capacity to love ..." These are the very values that a community as vigorous as the Jewish Community Center of Paramus/Congregation Beth Tikvah wants to galvanize. But few would respond without the call to action. Studying Torah is our guidebook to living as serious Jews. Tikkun olam (repairing the world) is what we can do when we reinforce those values for each other. That's what we mean by membership.

Dues are necessary, of course. If we're going to have a community, we have to have shelter: roof, lights, heat, clean floors and everything else we want for our home. But a sacred community calls us to be our best selves, to be transformed. And who wouldn't want to be a member of something this important, this vibrant, this wonderful?


There will be a guest appearance by one of the survivors.

Admission is free. Snacks will be available for a small fee to benefit the Friends of Israel Defense Forces (FIDF).



# **President's Message**

Taking the clue from the rabbi's Rosh Hashanah speech, I have appointed Wayne Zeiler, our second vice president, to chair a committee that will overlook the changes coming in the months ahead. This committee will be responsible to see that any changes are integrated seamlessly into our fabric.

I am pleased to announce that we have received two anonymous donations for the following purposes:

One donation is for a periodic

Friday night program for our children of high school age. The program, which is being formulated, will include a dinner at no cost and a chance for the teens to socialize with their peers.

The other donation is to refurbish the interior of the aron kodesh in the sanctuary. Details on the teen program and the refurbishing will be forthcoming.

As I announced on Rosh Hashanah, the sale of our Midland Avenue properties is moving along expeditiously and we expect to close the sale during the first guarter of 2016. As the closing was originally contracted to occur in August, the purchaser has agreed to pay us \$3,000 per month for the delay. The first \$3,000 payment was received in September.

Due to two accidents that occurred during the High Holidays - one on our property and the other not – I have instructed our personnel to make sure that first aid kits are properly filled and readily acceptable. Going forward, there will be one fully contained first aid kit on the table outside the synagogue entrance. So if an emergency occurs, our security staff will have quick access to the kit.

Please be aware that our annual Thanksgiving Turkey Drive will be on Wednesday, November 18. Please make every effort to donate food or give a check for those who are in need; the need is growing all the time.

### Every Day is Mitzvah Day

Our Fran Leib Memorial Fall Turkey Drive will take place on Wednesday, November 18. Please help our less fortunate neighbors eniov a full holiday meal. Frozen turkeys – kosher and non-kosher - are needed, along with the makings of a Thanksgiving dinner: canned sweet potatoes and cranberry sauce and other veggies, bags and boxes of stuffing, and any other non-perishable food you are able to donate. We also accept monetary donations in the form of ShopRite gift cards and checks made out to the Center for Food Action. Members of the Leib family, along with committee chair Roz Gerard, will be in the JCCP/CBT parking lot bright and early – from 7:15 to 9 a.m. - to receive your donations. If you are lucky, you may see Dan Leib in his turkey hat. If you can't make it to the synagogue that morning, you can drop off bags of food in the collection box in the synagogue lobby. We can even arrange to pick up your frozen turkey donations beforehand. Call the synagogue office for more information.

Once again, we will be asking for our membership to volunteer to "adopt" families through the Department of Human Services in Paramus to provide a complete Thanksgiving dinner, including a frozen turkey and fixings. Dan Leib is again coordinating this effort. More information, including a list of items needed, will be sent via email.

The JCCP/CBT will be a host site for **Jewish Federation of Northern** New Jersey's Mitzvah Day, on Sunday, November 1. We will be having a Blood Drive at our shul facilitated by the Red Cross. In addition, we will have collection boxes in the shul lobby for animal/pet supplies/toys.

New this year: We will be collecting items for emergency kits for Kosher Meals on Wheels recipients; other sites will assemble them.

We usually meet on the last Monday of the month, but we encourage you to knit on your own if you don't have time to come to our meetings. 

## Men's Club



## **DAIRY RUGELACH**

### Dough:

2 cups flour 1/2 pound butter 1 egg 3/4 cup sour cream

### Filling:

3/4 cup sugar 3/4 cup chopped walnuts 1/2 cup raisins 1 teaspoon cinnamon



Recipe by Beth Chananie

Mix together butter, egg, and sour cream. Add all the flour. Knead until smooth. Refrigerate for 1 hour at least or overnight if possible. Divide into 6 balls. Roll out each ball into a thin circle. Sprinkle with filling. Cut into triangles. Roll up, starting with the base.

Bake on ungreased cookie sheet for 20 minutes at 375 degrees. Take out when lightly browned.
