Stanley and Dr. Selma Mitchel

It was April of 1945, and the ashes of the Second World War were still warm. Millions had lost their lives, and destruction, despair and ruins were the landscape of the time. From different



parts of the world, from different backgrounds and with varying life experiences, Selma and Stanley met.

Stanley (Zelig) was born on January 15, 1909. He spent his formative years and early adult life in Pinsk, Poland, where life was rich in Jewish tradition, family bonds and dreams of Palestine, as Israel was then known. Stanley studied in yeshivot and technical schools, where he displayed exceptional abilities. He invented and designed a number of things, including the mechanical pump upon which the Jews of the Ghetto depended for their water.

Stanley had a large family and a flourishing business, but the life that he knew previously ended suddenly and painfully with the onslaught of the Nazi invasion of World War II. Stanley was taken away to the Russian army and by a tragic twist of fate, found himself in the hands of the Nazis for four agonizing years during which he expected that each day could be his last day alive. Miraculously, he survived and at the end of the war returned to his hometown of Pinsk in search of his family, his home and his identity. He found nothing. Physically, emotionally and mentally debilitated, and in search of help, Stanley registered in a medical clinic. It was there that he met Selma, the young doctor who was treating him.

Cantor Sam and Dr. Raisy Weiss

Sam Weiss and Raisy Kestenbaum were both born in Brooklyn. They were introduced by mutual friends who thought they were made for each other (or deserved each other) because they both



made outrageous puns. They became engaged after six months of exchanging puns, and three months later they exchanged wedding rings. Both were raised in Orthodox homes and had yeshiva educations. Both went to Brooklyn College and from there to graduate school at Columbia University. He majored in Spanish and studied linguistics in grad school; she majored in philosophy and went on to get her Ph.D. in philosophy at Columbia.

The newlyweds lived one year in Brooklyn before moving to Norwich, CT, where Cantor Weiss had his first cantorial position while pursuing a Master's degree in music at the University of Connecticut. After a two-year stint in Norwich, the couple lived for three years in Wilmington, DE, where he served as cantor of the Adas Kodesch Shel Emeth Congregation and she kicked up a storm in that synagogue's Israeli dance group. In 1979 it was off to Baltimore, where they lived for eighteen years. Their daughters Miriam and Dena were born there, first attending Baltimore's Bais Yaakov School for Girls and then the Hebrew Academy of Greater Washington.

Raisy and Cantor take great pride in their lovely and accomplished daughters, who attended Frisch High School after the Weisses moved to Oradell in 1997.

Selma, originally Sara, was born on September 1, 1919, in Bobruisk, Belarus (Russia). After the Revolution, Bobruisk was under the Communist regime. Selma's parents, products of Czarist Russia, were scholarly and well educated in Jewish traditions. They had Hebrew prayer books with Russian translations, and in spite of possible reprisals, celebrated Jewish holidays in secret. Education and music were emphasized in her early life, and while deprived of material things, Selma's family life was quite rich in culture.

In 1940, Selma began studying medicine at Leningrad (St. Petersburg) Medical School. One year later, in 1941, the war interrupted her medical studies. She was separated from her parents and family members, whom she never heard from again, learning later that they had all been brutally killed by the Nazis. With no one else left alive, Selma and her sister Bella were evacuated to Omsk, Siberia, were they were forced to endure two incredibly difficult years. In 1944, Selma completed her medical training at the Moscow Medical School, and immediately upon finishing was sent to work as a clinical physician in Pinsk.

In April, of 1945, Selma and Stanley met. Their mutual background of loss, loneliness and the need for Jewish kinship led to bonds of understanding, friendship, love and ultimately, marriage. Their marriage was only the beginning of a remarkable journey that has lasted 65 incredible years.

The newly married couple spent two years in a Displaced Persons camp in Germany, dreaming always of going to the United States. Their first child, Francine (Frieda), a beautiful symbol of their new beginning, was born in Heidelberg. The Mitchels came to the U.S. in 1948, penniless, with no place to stay, no knowledge of the English language and with a one-year-old child in their arms. Their goals, their strong work ethic, and an indomitable will to survive enabled them to overcome almost impossible obstacles.

Living in Brooklyn and wishing to resume her medical career, Selma worked in hospitals day and night for 10 grueling years until she became a licensed physician with a specialty in Pediatrics. In September of 1957, Selma and Stanley were blessed with the birth of their second child, Tamara, who brought them much joy and enriched their lives.

Stanley always worked hard to support his family. He was associated with Westinghouse and Bendix Enterprises in the coin-operated vending machine business. Business flourished, and in 1956, Stanley, Dr. Selma and their two daughters left Brooklyn for Paramus. Dr. Mitchel began a Pediatric practice and Stanley, while continuing his coin-operated vending business, ventured into real estate in New Jersey and upstate New York.

One of the first things the Mitchels did after settling in Paramus was to become members of the newly formed JCCP. At that time the entire membership consisted of just a few families and there was no synagogue building. Religious services were conducted in the Paramus firehouse and later in the basement of Bamberger's, soon to become Macy's department store. Selma and Stanley contributed to the building of our current synagogue and participated in the groundbreaking ceremonies.

Francine was the first child from Paramus to attend Yavneh Academy, then located in Paterson. It was in fifth grade at Yavneh that Francine met her future husband, Richard Winters. For Stanley and Selma the JCCP became a spiritual sanctuary and an integral part of their family life. With the blessings of our rabbis, it was here that Selma and Stanley celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary, the naming of their grandchildren, the grandchildren's Bat and Bar Mitzvahs, the naming of their great-grandchildren and many other meaningful events.

Selma and Stanley Mitchel are longtime members of the Board of Governors and have always supported JCCP fundraising campaigns and Israel Bonds, and sponsored numerous Oneg Shabbats as well. Their gift to the JCCP, the Holocaust sculpture "Zachor" at the front of our sanctuary, was dedicated by the Mitchels after many years of consideration and planning, and will serve as a lasting memorial for generations to come.

Miriam graduated from Barnard with a double degree in psychology and music and has since earned two Master's degrees, one in cognitive psychology at the University of Toronto and another in mental health counseling at Yeshiva University's Ferkauf School of Psychology. Dena graduated from NYU with a degree in Religious Studies. She continued her Jewish studies at the Pardes Institute in Israel and her general studies in religion at Harvard Divinity School, where she received a Master's degree in Theological Studies.

Raisy began teaching philosophy while still a graduate student. She taught part-time at Brooklyn College, Columbia, and the University of Delaware before getting her first full-time position in 1981 at Hood College in Frederick, MD. After teaching at Hood, she was hired full-time by the University of Delaware and earned another advanced degree, a Master's in Jewish Studies from Baltimore Hebrew University. In 1991 she was appointed professor at Lehigh University where she is currently chair of the Philosophy Department and holds the Clara H. Stewardson Chair in Philosophy.

Raisy has authored three books on Plato and is working on her fourth. She has also published many articles on Greek and Jewish Philosophy and lectures frequently in America and Israel, Canada and Europe. She is very active at the JCCP as well, where she sings in the High Holiday choir and with the JCCP Singers. She has lectured for the George Reiss Memorial Lecture program, been a facilitator for the JCCP book club, and regularly attends, and often leads, our Drosh 'n Nosh program. Raisy is a proud JCCP marcher at the Israel Day Parade, a member of Hadassah and AMIT, and a staunch supporter of Israel.

After concluding his university studies in languages and teaching briefly in the New York City public schools, Sam Weiss embarked on a musical career by training for the cantorate at Yeshiva University's Belz School of Jewish Music, building on his familiarity with Jewish liturgical and popular song and on his years of experience as a dance-band musician. He became a full-time Hazzan in 1976, serving congregations in Norwich, Wilmington and Baltimore until 1997, at which time he began as our Cantor at the JCCP.

At our 2007 Selichot reception, along with acknowledging Raisy's contributions to the congregation, the JCCP recognized our Cantor's excellence in prayer leadership, teaching, choral conducting, innovative programming, and scholarship. Of all his accomplishments for our synagogue community, however, Cantor Weiss is most proud of the nearly 300 B'nai Mitzvah students he has taught with affection and helped guide toward Jewish and personal maturity.

Sam Weiss has concertized in various cities, including Czernowitz, Ukraine, for the World Council for Yiddish Culture, and Warsaw and Jerusalem for the Cantors Assembly's historic 2009 mission to Poland and Israel. He was a founding member of The Heritage Trio, three Baltimore cantors serving Orthodox, Conservative, and Reform congregations. The trio toured the East Coast for a decade, and were Jewish cultural ambassadors to countless public school children through their creative Young Audiences of Maryland programs.

Our cantor has performed and recorded with several ensembles, and played the trumpet professionally for over thirty years. He has taught a variety of musical and Judaic subjects at Baltimore Hebrew University, The Academy for Jewish Religion, as well as at popular venues such as the American Jewish Choral Festival, Klezkamp, Klezkanada, and the Rozhinke retreat. He has collaborated with klezmer musicians in several creative projects, and was a writer and consultant for Mysteries of the Sabbath, a CD which introduced the early cantorial masters to a new generation of listeners.

Much sought after for his expertise in liturgical, religious and folk traditions, Cantor Weiss regularly answers Internet inquiries from all over the world on these and related subjects. In his induction as an Honorary Fellow of the H.L. Miller Cantorial School, The Jewish Theological Seminary cited him as "exemplifying the ideal of Hazzan-scholar." He is a contributing editor of The Journal of Synagogue Music, and a writer and performer for the United Synagogue's acclaimed Voices of the Conservative Movement series of recordings. He is a recipient of the Cantors Assembly's Samuel Rosenbaum Award for Creativity and Scholarship and was recently appointed to that organization's Executive Council.



From the Rabbi

How many of you remember the first "Spiderman" movie? There is a great scene when Toby McGuire, aka Spiderman, realizes his power and uses it in a cage fighting event to win a great sum of money. Yet before that happens, his uncle, who has some inkling that his nephew has some sort of unique strength and qualities, gives him of some of the greatest advice that anyone has ever shared with another. He reminds him that "with great power comes great responsibility."

This is not a new or radical thought. It is a principle of law, as well as a standard of morality. It also happens to be true. Anyone can make a mistake. Anyone can commit a crime. But the higher your position, the more your mistakes, crimes, and lack of judgment will have a negative impact on those around you.

Our Rabbis understood this. They taught that as bad as it was to transgress a law of the Torah, to do so in public where others could see was even worse. But the worst offense was when one's actions caused others to transgress as well. Their point was clear: Leaders, teachers, elected officials, Rabbis - anyone in a position of authority and influence over others - had and continues to have not only the general standards of conduct to maintain, but a unique standard based on their ability to cause harm.

Which makes the subject of my column this month so painful to address. But I would fail in my responsibility as a Rabbi if I chose to ignore it. This past month there was an important story from Israel. It was a public letter initiated by a prominent Rabbi and co-signed by other leading Rabbis in Israel urging Jewish Israelis to refrain from renting or selling apartments and homes to Arabs and other non-Jews. This is what I have called Rabbis behaving badly - really badly.

Some background to this story. About two months ago, the Chief Rabbi of Sefat, Rabbi Schmuel Eliyahu, issued a Halachic (Jewish legal) ruling urging Israelis not to rent their properties to others. This led to clashes between Arabs and Jews in Sefat. This letter was then co-signed by many other Rabbis throughout Israel, including some very significant and prominent ones, among others.

I know there are those who might be tempted to start justifying, rationalizing and otherwise trying to undermine the significance or importance of this horrible and vile deed. Go ahead; I have heard them all.

Rabbi, don't you know that the Palestinians say and do similar things?

Let me answer by saying simply that God forbid we find justification for our own abdication of Jewish law and values on the basis of the values of people who glorify the murder of women and children. That they behave badly is terrible. But it cannot and must not serve as a justification for our bad behavior.

Rabbi, certainly not all Rabbis signed that letter.

Certainly true, thank God. The truth is that most Rabbis in Israel have not signed. But that is only one part of the story. That many have indeed signed, and among them as I noted earlier some very influential Rabbis, is a Chilul Hashem, a desecration of God's

name. For they undermine the Torah's insistence on the rights and dignity of non-Jews, especially with regard to the fair application of law. I am happy to report that many leading Rabbis refused to sign, and bitterly criticized those who did. Indeed, we can all be proud that the Conservative movement and its Rabbinic leadership took such a prominent and vocal public position against this letter, criticizing it on both legal as well as moral grounds. But the genie is out of the bottle and the damage to Israel's reputation, and the damage to the good name of Judaism, will be hard to repair. We should all be proud of Prime Minister Netanyhu's quick and unequivocal denunciation of this letter and the Rabbis who signed it, as well as the denunciation of others across the political spectrum. I can only hope and pray that their words will be matched by legal and even legislative means to insure that these Rabbis are punished – and stopped.

I admit that I can truly understand the pain and fear that motivates such a lashing out against Arabs in Israel. But I will not be guided nor influenced by it.

I can understand what might cause a person to act in this fashion. But the Torah tells us that we are capable of overcoming our passions and motivations in order to create something better. And I am under no such obligation to extend that same courtesy to a religious leader, who must set an example. They know better, and thus need to do better, for they destroy real lives with their poor judgment.

If we want to assert some moral high ground when we hear the vile and evil statements made by Arab and Muslim leaders against Israel and Jews on a most regular basis, as we rightfully ask, Where are the moderates, where are our allies among those communities who will speak out and denounce this evil talk?, then we'd better get in line and speak out now, forcefully and unequivocally.

To the Rabbis who signed the letter: Your interpretation of the Torah and Jewish law is an embarrassment and desecration of all we hold sacred. To discriminate is not a Jewish value. Neither is ignoring those who say it is. When leaders, even Rabbis, are behaving badly, the community simply needs to step up and say so.

Our SHABBAT DINNER was tasty and enjoyable. Our students, under the guidance of Cantor Weiss, led a very nice Kabbalat Shabbat service. SCHOOL ON SHABBAT was well attended; the children enjoyed different fruits in honor of Tu b'Shvat. Our sincere thanks go to APT for these two events.

Participation in the KEHILLAH program at the Y continued for both the sixth- and seventh-grade students. Our seventh grade also visited the HOLOCAUST MUSEUM in Spring Valley, N.Y. They explored the permanent exhibition and spoke with a Holocaust survivor, Ben Storch.

JUNIOR CONGREGATION meets every Shabbat. Attendance at services is a requirement for our Hebrew school children. Early Childhood Center News

...and you shall teach them diligently to your children...

and you shall write them on the doorposts of your house...

Our pre-kindergarten class has just completed a multifaceted study of the mezuzah. This curriculum unit is a wonderful example of how good early childhood practice can integrate a Judaic theme with language, music, movement, art, and math; bridge the gap between home and school for the children; and even strengthen the connection between the ECC and the rest of the JCCP.

The class, with teachers Harriet Cohen and Janie Horowitz, met me at the JCCP one morning for the purpose of counting mezuzot there. Joe Herrmann joined us on our field trip through the main floor of the building. The teachers had a clipboard with them, and each time a mezuzah was spotted, a child wrote a tick mark on a grid. We noticed different kinds of mezuzot; we saw them in interior and exterior doorways. We saw the doorways to the rabbi's office, the kitchen, the sanctuary, and the gym (and other places, too). With some directed questions from me, the children observed that doors to the bathrooms do not have me-

Back at the ECC, the children counted the tick marks they had made. Do YOU know how many mezuzot are on the first floor of the JCCP? WE do!** The children also made a graph of how many mezuzot are in their own homes, and counted mezuzot in the ECC building.

By now, the children in the class were very invested and interested in mezuzot. The teachers showed them examples of different mezuzot, graciously lent to us by the Sisterhood gift shop. The children got to feel and hold an actual piece of parchment, and they understand that both a mezuzah klapf and the Torah are written on parchment iust like this. They learned several songs about mezuzot, even making up verses about different places that might have a mezuzah in their doorways. Then each child painted a wooden mezuzah, put in a "parchment" with the first line of the Sh'ma, and pasted the letter Shin on the outside. At our writing center, the children had the opportunity to try to write the letter Shin or the word "Sh'ma" themselves if they wished. As a class, the children also decorated another me-

As a culminating activity, the children spent an enriching hour with Rabbi Weiner, who came to visit the class and hang the mezuzah they had made. He chatted with them about their trip to the JCCP, hearing that they had seen the mezuzah in the doorway to his office. Then it was time to hang the mezuzah the children had made for the school. We said the blessing for hanging a mezuzah; the children already knew that the blessing contains the word mezuzah! Then Rabbi Weiner affixed the mezuzah (containing a genuine klapf) in an "empty" doorway, allowing each child a turn with the hammer. This mezuzah, now a permanent fixture at the ECC, is at a height where the children can easily touch it. On the same day, each child took home the mezuzah she had made, with a letter to parents explaining how to affix it and suggesting that it be placed on the doorpost of the child's bedroom.

A unit like this one fulfills much of the purpose of a Jewish early childhood program: to offer hands-on, real experiences that incorporate curriculum areas like literacy and math, and to teach Torah — in words and in actions — to the next generation of Jews.






