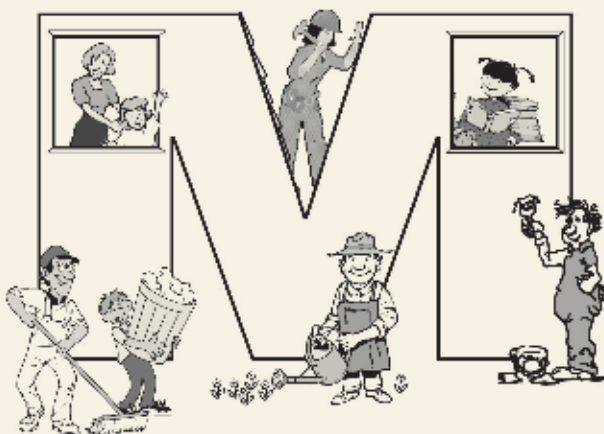

From the Desk of Rabbi Arthur D. Weiner



Rabbi, who are you going to vote for?

I am asked this often in the run-up to elections, and whenever it is posed to me I wonder what is really motivating the question. Is the poser really interested in what I'm thinking? Am I representing the tradition and its virtues to a member of the community who is seeking to give his or her precious vote to the candidate who best represents the finest in the Jewish tradition? Do they want to know if G-d is a Republican or a Democrat? (Not likely.)

Or is the truth that especially in these very challenging times, and facing such critical issues, people simply want to get it right, and are hopeful that religion has a voice that is far more nuanced, sophisticated and wise than the sophistry we often hear in our media and from our leaders?

It's an opportune time to consider this question, as the time for decision-making is upon us. As the Bulletin reaches you, Election Day is but days away, and if the experts are correct, these will be among the most significant mid-term elections in the post-World War II era.

The issues are staggering: a poor economy, war on two fronts, Iranian nuclear ambitions, concern over the president's agenda, un-

employment, health care, immigration, education, the national debt, and a divided electorate, to name but a few. Can our Torah and 300 years of accumulated wisdom add to our understanding of our responsibility? I believe the answer is yes.

As I write this column, Jews throughout the world are studying Parshat Noah, the biblical story of Noah and the flood. In our tradition, Noah's personal qualities often are compared to Abraham. The Torah tells us that Noah was a righteous person "in his generation" and walked with G-d, and there can be no doubt that Noah was righteous. To me it is incontrovertible that the plain meaning of the verse could imply anything else.

Yet the phrase "in his generation," which seems to somehow qualify the original statement attesting to Noah's righteousness, has always been understood as raising some doubt. Not that Noah wasn't great — he certainly was. But our Rabbis challenge us with the following question: While Noah was indeed great when compared with the low standards of his generation, would he have been considered great if he lived in a different era?

Noah may not have stood out so, the Rabbis conclude, had he lived in Abraham's generation.

What is the point of this rabbinic fantasy? Was this really a serious issue? Did the Rabbis really occupy their time trying to figure out who was better or more righteous, or more worthy? I don't think so.

Their point was to use the inconsistency in the verse to inspire those who read the Torah in subsequent generations to consider what it means to be good, moral and righteous not only compared with the standards of the day, but also when measured against the timeless values that Judaism teaches.

What was the Rabbis' problem with Noah? When G-d tells him

to build an ark because He is about to destroy the world, Noah builds the ark. He does what G-d tells him. That is a most reasonable response to G-d's suggestion. But the Midrash (the rabbinic legend) on this section criticizes Noah for not using the time to convince his neighbors to repent their evil ways. He was happy and content to save himself.

Abraham, by comparison, reacted differently when confronted with the news that G-d was about to destroy Sodom and Gomorrah. He literally argued with G-d and challenged G-d to spare the city on account of even the most minimally righteous that were present there. It certainly did not change G-d's mind, but it did show an aspect of Abraham's character and concern for others that was simply not present in Noah.

This Torah wisdom speaks to the challenges of our time: the challenge between meeting our own needs and our responsibility to the needs of others; the tension between trying to meet the needs of this hour and simultaneously understand how decisions made

today have a direct impact on what happens tomorrow. This is the awareness with which we ought to approach our local and national elections on Nov. 2.

Rabbi, who are you going to vote for?

I never answer the question. Though I am certainly flattered that others wish to know, I believe it is inappropriate to answer. (Two years ago, I said from the pulpit that I thought that "Rabbis for Obama," as well as other rabbis who publicly endorsed Senator McCain, made a terrible mistake.) I believe it is beneath the dignity of the rabbinate for any rabbi to pretend that he is in a greater position to understand what is best for the country than his congregants.

But the one thing I will do is to challenge you to think, and to use your vote not to support a Republican and not to support a Democrat, but to learn from our Rabbis' discussion of Noah's virtues and decide which candidates are capable of doing the right thing for our generation while also leading us in a direction that future generations will judge as honorable as well.

Early Childhood Center News

"It's not that unusual/When everything is beautiful/It's just another ordinary miracle today..."

Miracles happen; they do. The big miracles in our lives include moments of blessing: the birth of a baby, the recovery of a loved one from a desperate illness, the deliverance from a natural disaster. For those of us who have made our life's work the development and nurturing of young children, however, the work-a-day miracles we continuously witness sometimes go unnoticed in the hubbub of "getting things done," "meeting curriculum guidelines" and "keeping children safe." But they are there nonetheless: the continuous miracles of children developing, discovering, thinking and interacting.

A day in the life of our Early Childhood Center is miraculous indeed. Here's a window onto an actual day not long ago.

The Pre-K and Threes' teachers had decided, as they periodically do, to open the doors between their classrooms for a portion of the morning, creating a continuous space in which the children interacted as a multi-age grouping. This meant each child could choose from more than double the usual complement of activities.

One new activity that day was playing at our "rice table." The teachers had filled a piece of furniture known as a "water table" (a large wooden frame with a plastic tub liner) with uncooked rice instead of water, and invited the children to explore it. There wasn't much in the tub besides a large quantity of rice; just some spoons, measuring cups and

funnels. But what opportunities for sensory discovery, divergent thinking and intellectual scaffolding lay in that mound of rice!

A teacher standing with a group of children at the rice table made comments and asked questions, which extended the children's experience. They talked about how rice feels on their hands and how rice sounds as it is poured from container to container (consider: it sounds much different in a metal bowl than in a plastic deli container). For the younger children, it was exciting to pour rice from one cup to another, to spoon it into a bowl, or to simply run their hands through it and let it fall through their fingers. (That was actually pretty satisfying for me, too, moving my hands through the rice.)

The older children described how the hard rice became stuck in a narrow funnel, used measurement words, and talked about when they have eaten rice. "Can we cook rice sometime?" one of them asked a teacher, and of course we will. We'll continue to use the rice table often, and it will lead us to other experiences besides cooking; such as learning about different cultures where people eat rice and hearing the Maurice Sendak poem "Chicken Soup with Rice." We can weigh rice, color rice, make collages from it, make and eat rice pudding — the list is endless! All that from a few pounds of rice!

But the rice table wasn't the only experience going on during that miraculous morning. We were preparing to decorate the new sukkah in our yard, and some children made decorations for it. Others tried to construct a sukkah from blocks; then they made models of sukkot out of Play-Doh and toothpicks. Later, a few children dictated songs about "going to a sukkah" to a teacher; the teacher carefully transcribed the children's words and bound the songs into a book that they are still looking at and "reading" weeks later. Children painted at the easel that morning, heard stories and played together in the early fall sunshine.

"It's just another ordinary miracle today..." Every day with young children is a miracle!

President's Message

It's been nearly five years since our synagogue sponsored a trip to Israel, and as I am writing this while in Israel, I feel we are more than due to do it again. The only way to fully understand Israel's beauty, sensitivity, history and role in our lives is to be here breathing the air, with our feet on the same ground that David and Solomon tread and Ben-Gurion and Moshe Dayan after them. To better know the delicate nature of its borders, you need to see Israel for yourself, its mountains and rivers and seas.

While I write this, we are passing farms with rich soil and recently harvested fruit and vegetables. and within seconds we are driving past Tel Megiddo, an active archaeological site of 21 separate civilizations. The day before in Jerusalem, we met with the parents of captured Israeli soldier Gilad Shalit, who are living in a tent outside the Prime Minister's Office waiting for some movement on their son. I assured them that our synagogue supports every effort to find a way to free Gilad from his Hamas captors. To find out how we can help, contact our Israel Awareness Committee.

A few days earlier we had hiked the Judean Desert, at the waterfalls of Ein Gedi, where a young David hid from a jealous King Saul. This is a wonderful place to see wildlife, from the sociable hyrax (a large rodent thought to be related to elephants), to jackals, wolves, hyenas and maybe a leopard, if you're very lucky. Aside from its natural beauty, your reward for your hike to the top is a cooling dip in a pool from a series of waterfalls. Masada and the resorts/spas by the Dead Sea are only a short ride from Ein Gedi.

Our next two days will be spent in the Galilee, a geologically diverse area equally rich in history and cultural interest. We're stuck in a traffic jam on a mountain road overlooking the Kinneret, behind a convoy of trailers carrying new tanks to the army bases near the Golan. It reminds me of our first family trip to Israel some 17 years ago. Before we headed to Ben Gurion Airport, our guide took us to Yad Vashem, which we visited in complete silence. Nor was a word spoken as we left for the airport or on the plane back home to New Jersey.

When we got home at about 7 a.m., we sat together for breakfast. From nowhere, my then-10-year-old daughter, Dana, stopped eating and said, "Daddy, now I know why everyone carries guns in Israel. It's so no other Jews will be killed or murdered."

At that moment, I knew the trip was a success.

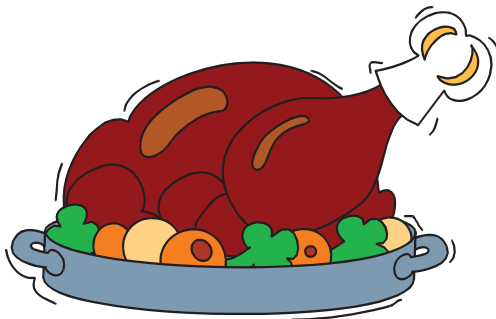

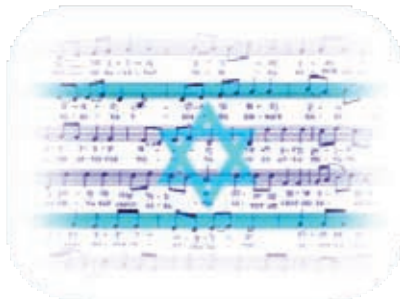
