## From the Rabbi

Years ago, I taught the congregation the rabbinical ruling that one is to start thinking about the laws of Passover 30 days before Passover actually begins. Even as we are concluding our observance of Purim, our attention begins to shift to what is arguably the most important and most fundamental of Jewish holidays. The extra preparation time is a testament to the importance of this holiday.

Once upon a time, 30 days was enough. But I happened to be at a local kosher supermarket this week (and I am writing this more than a week before Purim to make the April Bulletin deadline) and already they are clearing shelf space for Passover supplies. The amount of Passover products is growing, the pre-Passover season is becoming longer and longer, and there are more opportunities than ever for learning about Passover. The challenge for our time is not how difficult it is to make Passover, but whether Passover can remain as compelling an experience in our generation as it has been, historically speaking, in our past.

We know that in many ways, Passover may be the best-observed Jewish holiday. Let me rephrase: The Passover Seder may be the most-observed Jewish ritual. While many Jews fast on Yom Kippur and even more light the Chanukah menorah, almost everyone will be at some type of a Seder on Passover. There will be differences among the Seders, and you and I and your

neighbor might differ as to what constitutes a proper Jewish Seder. But what we know from a study of the many different *Haggadot* used on Passover is that all of them share one common idea: to tell the story of the liberation of the Jewish people from Egypt, and to help us reflect on what the experience of freedom means and the responsibilities it imposes on us.

Some may follow a more traditional format, others a more modern one. Some will explain and celebrate the *Yitziat Mizraim* (the liberation from Egypt) from a more particularistic point of view, and others may choose to connect our own narrative of liberation to communities still struggling to achieve theirs. Yet all Seders will use the core Passover principle of questions and answers, and telling our unique story, to share and be moved by the experience.

We have a collective responsibility to make sure that everyone sitting at our Seders has the opportunity to come away with something of value as a result of the experience of sharing Passover together. All of us must serve as educators to those around our tables who may not have the same sense of responsibility for the Jewish faith as we have. As our Jewish educators often tell us, we must find “teachable moments” and then make the most of the opportunities that those moments present. We must share our devotion, love and commitment to our Judaism, as well as (and this is difficult, I know) exactly how and why we feel these feelings.

As difficult as it may seem, and as daunting a responsibility as it might appear to be, the truth is that the Passover actually lends itself to this challenge. You don’t need to be a professional Jewish educator to help someone find their place, to ask questions or to inspire others. What we do need is an awareness that as perhaps no other time in recent Jewish history, we have so many Jews who are waiting to be inspired, to feel

and understand something, so we must make the most of our opportunities to help them find their place in the tradition. That we care is great. That we may be in a position to help others find their way to a better appreciation of their Judaism is even greater.

Many are familiar with the questions at the beginning of the Passover Seder that represent four types of children — the wise, the simple, the wicked and the one who is unable to even ask a question. The last one refers not just to the young, but to those among us who don’t even know where to begin to gain the understanding and an appreciation of the

Seder at which they sit. Yet they are there, and we must make the most of those moments.

The Haggadah teaches us that for such people, those who simply don’t know how to ask, *At P’tach Lo*, that we must begin the explanation and conversation for them. We can’t wait. We must seize the initiative to teach, share and welcome others to the heritage that means so much. It must begin with us. And Passover just may be the best time to start.

I wish you all a happy and kosher Passover. Please take the time to look at the important Passover information contained throughout the Bulletin.

## From the Executive Director

Pesach is probably my favorite and most dreaded Jewish holiday of the year. My favorite because growing up in a "matriarchal" household in Queens (where my maternal grandmother, two aunts, one uncle, a German shepherd and my brother, mother and father all lived in the same three-family home) two blocks from our Jewish center, Passover was a unique holiday. The specially prepared foods, tasted only at this time of year, were truly memorable and worth the wait. Matzah brei, knaidlach, charoset and more dazzled the taste buds and to this day evoke strong, warm memories.

Why my most dreaded holiday? Invariably my birthday was either on or right around Passover. Those same special foods also restricted greatly what I could consume. I love matzah (with butter, schmaltz, whatever), but I've also grown averse to strawberry, blueberry or banana shortcake, as back in the day, my mother would make a Passover sponge cake dry as the cardboard box from which the cake meal came and then try to camouflage it with whipped cream and freshly sliced fruits (none of which I eat today).

Nowadays, with the advent of kosher agri-conglomerates and flash-freezing, we really want for nothing. Passover is not an austere holiday anymore. Want a hot dog, tacos, pizza, spaghetti or chocolate mousse? Just visit your neighborhood grocery store and you'll find it all on the dry goods shelves or in the fresh or frozen food cases.

Synagogues unfortunately aren't so lucky. We can't run to the supermarket to fulfill our weekday, Shabbat and holiday needs. At this time of year, cash on hand has

dwindled from our September highwater mark, and we try to project our finances through the end of our fiscal year (June 30) so that we may continue to provide the same level of programming and service to which we've been accustomed. Some years it's more challenging than others, but even under the best of circumstances, it takes a great deal of work to stay within budget. Also, as the song says, "We get by with a little help from our friends!"

You, our friends, are the people on whom we depend. Our community is most generous throughout the year, making donations, or sponsoring activities or Onegs and Kiddushes. Dues alone do not cover all of our expenses, and while we're very prudent about how we spend every dollar, we still need donations and "over and above" dues funding to sustain us.





# ~ Guide to Pesach Preparation ~

**1. DEFINITION OF CHAMETZ ...** In Exodus 12:15 the Bible tells us: *Seven days you shall eat unleavened bread: on the very first day you shall remove leaven from your houses ...* The Rabbis specified five grains which can become *chametz*: wheat, barley, spelt, rye and oats. Additionally, Ashkenazic authorities prohibited rice and *kitniot* (legumes including beans, peas, lentils, corn, maize, millet and mustard). While rice and *kitniot* are not strictly speaking *chametz*, they cannot be eaten, but can be “used” as in cornstarch powder or medicines. It is easiest if they, and products containing them, are treated like *chametz*. Sephardic authorities prohibit only the five specified grains, and thus Sephardic Jews are allowed to eat legumes and rice during Passover. According to Jewish law, *matzah* may be baked using any one, *but only one*, of the five acceptable grains. Traditionally it is made from wheat.

**2. GENERAL LAWS CONCERNING CHAMETZ ...** During Passover it is prohibited to derive any benefit whatsoever from *chametz*. One may not eat *chametz*, or run a business involved in the buying or selling of *chametz*. Even ownership of *chametz* is forbidden. We are also obliged to remove *chametz* from our possession. This is done by a *bitul*, renouncing the possession of all *chametz* in one’s household, using the *kol chamira* formula found in the beginning of most *haggadot*. Any *chametz* left over should be burned. Another way of renouncing ownership is by selling the *chametz* in one’s possession. (See *mechirat chametz*).

**A. PREPARATION OF THE HOME FOR PASSOVER ...** Special care must be taken with Passover foods. If a mistake is made while preparing foods during the rest of the year, the law provides several remedies. These remedies do not apply, however, to the laws of *chametz*. The laws of annulment (one part in sixty) do not apply regarding *chametz*. Chemicals permitted during the year might be prohibited on Passover. All utensils, pots, dishes, counters and anything used for the preparation of food must be *kasher*. If it is not possible to *kasher* them, they should be replaced with utensils used exclusively on Passover. All areas of the house should be thoroughly cleaned and examined for *chametz*. A person renting a room from a non-Jew (e.g. a student in a dormitory) is responsible only for the space he or she occupies. Traditionally an additional search (*bedika chametz*) is held the evening before the first day of Passover, using a candle for light and a feather with which to sweep up crumbs.

**B. SALE OF CHAMETZ ...** It is sometimes impossible to destroy or remove all of the *chametz* in one’s possession, especially when great financial sacrifice is involved (*hefsed merubah*). Therefore, rabbinic authorities used a legal device embodying a special sale called *mechirat chametz* which is arranged through a Rabbi. Since the *chametz* is sold to a non-Jew, it does not belong to a Jew during Passover. All *chametz* to be sold is isolated from the food and utensils used on Passover. Pets and other animal food should also be sold (although they remain in the house as usual) since most animal food contains *chametz*. The Rabbi arranges for all materials thus sold, to be sold back immediately after Passover.

**3. PROHIBITED FOODS ...** Prohibited foods include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol. Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (*kitniot*) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes, beans and peas. String beans, however, are permitted. The Committee on Jewish Law and Standards of the Rabbinical Assembly has ruled unanimously that peanuts and peanut oil are permissible. Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form

other than their natural state, for example, corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Consult the rabbi for guidance in the use of these products.

#### **4. PERMITTED FOODS ...**

**A. The following foods require a *kosher le-Pesach* label if purchased prior to Pesach:** Unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives (however, be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP), sugar, pure tea, salt (non-iodized), pepper, natural spices, frozen fruit juices with no additives, frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes, see previous page), milk, butter, cottage cheese, cream cheese, ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft), and Camembert (soft), frozen uncooked fruit with no additives and baking soda.

**B. The following foods do not require a *kosher le-Pesach* label if purchased before or during Pesach:** Fruits and vegetables eggs, fresh fish and fresh meat. (For legumes, see paragraph 3).

**C. The following foods require a *kosher le-Pesach* label if purchased before or during Pesach:** All baked products (*matzah*, cakes, *matzah* flour, farfel, *matzah* meal, and any products containing *matzah*), canned or bottled fruit juices (these juices often contain *kitniot* which are not listed among the ingredients. However, if one knows there are no such agents, then the juice may be purchased prior to Pesach without a kosher le-Pesach label). Wine, vinegar, liquor, oils, dried fruits, candy, chocolate flavored milk, ice cream, yogurt and soda are in this category. Canned tuna, even when packed in water, has often been processed in vegetable broth and/or hydrolyzed protein. If it is known that the tuna is packed exclusively in water, without any additional ingredients or additives, it may be purchased without a kosher le-Pesach label.

**D. The following processed foods (canned, bottled or frozen), require a *kosher le-Pesach* label if purchased during Pesach:** Milk, milk products, butter, fruit, juices, vegetables, spices, coffee, tea, and fish, as well as all foods listed in paragraph 4C above.

#### **5. OTHER “NON-FOOD” CONSIDERATIONS ...**

**A. MEDICINES ...** Because the principle of *pikuach nefesh* (the preservation of life) takes precedence over all other laws, all medicines prescribed by a doctor in connection with life-sustaining therapy are permitted on Passover. Be aware that all medications, e.g. aspirin, vitamins and tranquilizers, while not made from *chametz*, may contain *chametz* as a binder. That is why, as a general rule, capsules are preferable to tablets. As in all cases, when a question arises, the Rabbi should be consulted. Generally we are very lenient with regard to medicine.

**B. COSMETICS ...** Lotions, ointments and creams need no special Passover formulation. Many other cosmetics however, have an alcohol base. Those made from grain alcohol are regarded as *chametz*.

**C. BABY FOOD ...** Baby food for Passover use is readily available. If Passover baby food cannot be obtained, however, the baby's food should be prepared in a separate part of the house so that this food is not mixed with food for other members of the family.

**D. PET FOOD ...** Most pet foods contain *chametz*. Both the pet and the pet food should be sold (see *mechirat chametz*) during Passover. This arrangement can be discussed with the Rabbi.

**6. KASHERING UTENSILS AND APPLIANCES FOR PASSOVER ...** Purging and open flame are the two basic methods of *kashering*,

**A. PURGING (*Hag'alah*) ...** Most cooking utensils can be made kosher by immersion in boiling water. This includes metal pots, most baking pans, flatware and most other kitchenware. The procedure is as follows:

1. The article to be *kashered* is thoroughly scoured (cleaned).
2. The article is set aside and not used for 24 hours.
3. The article is completely immersed in a pot of actively boiling water.
4. The articles are then rinsed immediately under cold water.
5. If a pot is too large to fit into another pot, the pot to be kashered is filled to the brim with water, and that water is brought to a boil. While the water is boiling, a hot stone or piece of metal is dropped into the pot in order that the water is kept at its peak heat and also to ensure that the water boils over the side of the pot.
6. The pot in which the articles were kashered is itself kashered as per step 5 above.

**B. OPEN FLAME (*Libun*)** ... Any utensils which come into direct contact with fire, such as a barbecue spit, a barbecue grill, a broiling pan or rack, is kashered by open flame. The procedure is as follows:

1. The article to be *kashered* is thoroughly scoured (cleaned).
2. The article is set aside and not used for 24 hours.
3. The article is then put under an open flame and thoroughly heated until the metal glows red hot or is so hot that a piece of paper is singed when it is touched to the metal.

**C. SPECIAL CASES** ... Utensils with wooden handles cannot be kashered, because particles of food which could lodge between the handle and the blade cannot be effectively removed by purging. The proper method to *kasher* glassware is to soak it in clear water for 72 hours, changing the water every 24 hours. Fine (glazed) china that has not been used for twelve months can be considered as new. Earthenware and other pottery cannot be *kashered*, since whatever they absorb cannot be purged. Most glazes are porous, and thus cannot be *kashered*. Utensils covered with a non-stick surface such as Teflon can be *kashered* like other utensils. Countertops and tables made of Formica or other laminates should be thoroughly scoured. Those made of wood are scraped with a steel brush. The surface is then left bare for 24 hours, after which the surface is thoroughly rinsed with boiling water poured directly from the pot in which it was boiled.

**D. APPLIANCES** ... An oven is thoroughly scoured. The burners are then turned on full until the metal glows red hot or a piece of paper is singed when touched to the metal. Remove all plastic knobs from around the oven to prevent melting. If the oven is of the continuous cleaning type (not self-cleaning), the Rabbi should be consulted. The shelves and bins of refrigerators and freezers are removed in order to facilitate cleaning. The shelves, bins and walls are then thoroughly washed. A metal sink is *kashered* as is a large pot; a porcelain sink cannot be *kashered* and should be thoroughly scrubbed with heavy duty aluminum foil. Plastic tubs should be used to wash dishes. The interior of a dishwasher is thoroughly scoured, paying careful attention to the strainer over the drain. The dishwasher is left unused for 24 hours and then run through a wash cycle without soap. Any metal surface of a small appliance that comes in contact with food should be *kashered* by purging. Plastic parts are treated as mentioned above. An electric frying pan which can be immersed, should be purged. Many electrical appliances cannot be immersed and therefore cannot be *kashered*. An electric mixer should have its beaters purged and its bowls either purged (metal) or washed (glass). An electric can opener should have its blade and magnets removed and purged. The rest of the appliance should be cleaned so that no food remains in any crevice.

**E. MICROWAVE OVENS** ... Microwave ovens present a special case since the inside surface does not become hot. One recommended procedure is to thoroughly clean the inside and then place a dish of water into the oven and allow it to boil for a few minutes. If the oven is a combination microwave and standard oven, consult the Rabbi.

**HERE'S HOW TO SELL YOUR CHAMETZ**

1. After you've cleaned out all other Chametz, put your remaining Chametz in a place you can secure — a closet, an extra freezer, a cupboard, etc.
2. Seal it or lock it, not to be opened until after the last day of Pesach (it's not yours all that time in any case — the space is leased out!!!)
3. Sign the form below, empowering Rabbi Weiner as your agent in effecting the sale of your Chametz. **All forms must be received before Monday morning, April 14.** Please mail this form to the Jewish Community Center of Paramus/Congregation Beth Tikvah as soon as possible. On **Sunday, April 6, or by private arrangement,** you may come in person to sell the Chametz to Rabbi Weiner. Traditionally, a small donation is enclosed, a part of which is used for the sale of Chametz. The rest will be used for **Ma'ot Hittin**, helping the poor Jews with their Pesach needs.



## President's Message

### Experimenting with Open Meetings

One of the many benefits of the merger is that both congregations brought different viewpoints, histories, priorities and minhagim (customs) to our merged congregation. At a board meeting of the Jewish Community Center of Paramus/Congregation Beth Torah several months ago, just after the merger had formally occurred, that became evident when a member who had been an active CBT member but was not on the Board of Trustees of the JCCP/CBT sought to attend a board meeting, assuming that the board meetings were "open," as they had been in New Milford. Open board meetings had simply never been our part of our culture in Paramus, but the issue was now squarely before us.

In the months that followed, a presentation was made to the Executive Board by several former New Milford members who extolled the virtues of allowing open board meetings so members would not be receiving second- and third-hand information that may have been distorted when transmitted over the grapevine (so to speak). A follow-up presentation was made to the Board of Trustees in January, and as a result the board voted to try a three-month experiment of having open board Meetings. At the end of the three-month trial period, the board will revisit the issue and decide whether to continue the policy of opening board

meetings to all members and, if so, under what structure or conditions.

At the February Executive Board meeting (the Executive Board serves as a non-binding sounding and advisory board to the president and the Board of Trustees consisting of the synagogue's officers, representatives of the arms of the synagogue, such as those people chairing Sisterhood, Men's Club and Young Jewish Families, our executive director and guests invited by the president), the "ground rules" for how to conduct the open meetings during the experimental period were discussed and agreed upon.

The Executive Board recommended, and I as president accepted, the following "ground rules" for open board Meetings:

- Members in good standing are invited to attend the open portion of the monthly board meetings (the board typically meets on the third Thursday of each month, right after minyan).
- Associate members are not eligible to attend.
- The comment period will be limited to 10 minutes (board meetings tend to run late and the agenda is usually very full).
- Members can stay and observe the board proceedings after the 10-minute period has ended but are not permitted to speak.
- Members will be excluded from closed sessions, when the board is discussing sensitive topics such as personnel issues.
- The decision to close the meeting is at the president's discretion.
- there ha ha The open meetings are a three-month experiment and as such, the rules may be revised as time goes on and the board will review the policy of open meetings at the end of the three months and decide whether to continue the policy and, if so, how to change the process, if at all.

The first phase of the experiment started at our Feb. 20 board meet-

ing. About five non-board members were in attendance, including one member of the Nominating Committee who thought it would be beneficial to see the board in action in fulfilling responsibilities of the committee's members. At the beginning of the meeting, I announced the conditions agreed upon by the Executive Board. All the non-board members in attendance were respectful in making their comments during the 10-minute open comment period, although interestingly, not all members in attendance chose to speak. Those who came were a mixture of New Milford and JCCP "alumni."

The members in attendance continued to be respectful during the

observation period of a typically lengthy board meeting that finally adjourned at 10:35 p.m. One attendee left before the meeting adjourned, but that has been known to happen with board members as well, since the meetings do have a tendency to end late (and that's not even counting the impromptu "meeting" that usually occurs under the flickering lights of the parking lot.)

The experiment with open meetings was to continue on March 20. Another open meeting will be held on April 17, so please take advantage of the experiment and let your voice be heard. All members in good standing are invited to attend.



## JCCP/CBT BOARD OF TRUSTEES MINUTES

February 20, 2014

### GOOD AND WELFARE

- Harlan acknowledged the passing of Andy Rossmar, former president, board member and all-around mensch. He will be sorely missed, and our hearts go out to his family.
- Harlan acknowledged the passing of Gershon Rosenzweig's sister in Israel.
- On March 8, we are sponsoring a regional USY dance.
- Rabbi Weiner announced that Debbie and Richard Barbash have a new grandson.
- David and Hilda Luria celebrated their 60th anniversary last Saturday. Gary and Nina Glaser sponsored the Kiddush in their honor.
- Fred and Melitta Lorsch are celebrating their 60th anniversary this Shabbat and are sponsoring the Kiddush luncheon.
- Dan Leib announced that our annual Spring food drive will be on April 9.
- Roz Gerard announced that the annual walk-in dinner at the homeless shelter will be on March 9. They are expecting 140 people.
- Gary Hutmacher reported that cemetery plots are going to cost \$1,250 as of April 1. They are currently selling at \$1,000.
- Jack Bauer thanked everyone who participated in the Super Bowl raffle and Gary Hutmacher for selling so many tickets. \$1,000 went to prizes and \$1,000 went to our shul. The winners were Wendy Steinberg, Shel Schmidt, Keith Springer and Shawn Rabbani.
- Fred Harris announced that the Board of Trustees always contributes toward tickets for the Purim raffle, and while we usually have enough to purchase four tickets, we are currently at two. Please give your contribution for shares to Fred.
- Harlan announced that SLI is hosting a seminar that we should attend. It is titled "Outreach Lessons We Can Learn from Chabad," which will disclose Chabad "secrets" about what makes them so successful. The seminar is on March 3 from 6:30 to 9 p.m. at the Federation office in Paramus.
- Harlan shared an email he received from United Synagogue regarding retreats for organizations and synagogues at Camp Ramah. The idea is to organize a retreat over Shabbat, where congregants would share communal meals, activities, services, etc.
- Alan announced that Shabbat Across America is on March 7.
- Alan announced that we will be reinstating a community seder on the second night of Passover.

### CORRESPONDENCE

We received a letter from the Center for Food Action congratulating and thanking us for our consistent support. A

second letter thanked us for our efforts with the Fran Leib Turkey Drive, and a special thank you to Roz Gerard and Dan and Ann Leib. Thank you also to Paul Auerbach for the fresh produce.

Jewish Family Services of Bergen and North Hudson sent a letter thanking Rabbi Weiner for the ad supporting its gala.

A shul in Boulder, Colo., that suffered damage from flooding thanked us for our donation of \$360 for its relief effort.

### OPEN COMMENT PERIOD FROM MEMBERS

Harlan announced the guidelines for the open board meetings based on the decision of the Executive Board earlier in the week. It is a work in progress, so rules may change as we go along. Members in good standing may attend our board meetings; associate members are not eligible to attend. The open comment period from members will be limited to 10 minutes. Members can stay and observe proceedings after the 10-minute period but cannot speak. Members will be excluded from closed sessions, when we discuss sensitive topics, such as personnel issues. This is a three-month experiment, and we will review and decide if we continue, change the process, etc. A member who wishes to speak should first state his/her name so we have an accurate record.

Andy Jaffe reported that he is attending tonight as a non-board member who is on the nominating committee. He came to observe, so as the committee proceeds with its duties, he is knowledgeable on how the Board of Trustees works. Andy commended the board on doing a great job with the merger.

Elan Lipschitz recognized that the shul was going through changes and that we seem to be putting Band-Aids on our problems. He suggested that we set up a committee to look ahead for five years and assess where we stand, so we aren't constantly coming to the membership for more money.

### EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Harvey reported that membership is holding at 471.

We subscribe to State Police and U.S. Homeland Security publications, and Harvey shared a phone scam to be aware of that is preying mostly on foreigners. People are told that they owe money, and if they don't pay immediately with pre-paid cards, threats are made that the INS will be contacted.

We used to participate in the TD Bank Affinity Program until it was discontinued by United Synagogue. We will be re-establishing this program directly with TD Bank, which will give the synagogue a set amount for every account we register. The monies we receive are not related to the amount of money in the account but is simply a set amount based on the type of account that is registered (checking, Money Market, etc.). Those who had previously participated in the Affinity Program must sign up again.

**STAINED GLASS WINDOWS**

Jack Bauer reported that as per the merger agreement, and with the help of Arnie Brown, it has been decided that the stained glass windows will be installed in the Social Hall, hopefully in time for the Dinner Dance. Sisterhood will be giving the shul up to \$11,000 for the installation of the windows. Dan Leib wondered whether we could use the stained glass windows as a fundraiser.

**BUDGET/FINANCES/FUNDRAISING**

Harriet voiced her concerns about the budget projections for year-end 2014, and that steps need to be taken to return us to a balanced budget.

Harlan reported that Russell Rothman is chairing a subcommittee that is working on the dues structure.

Alan proposed a fundraising idea by which Document Data Destruction, a company that does business/computer recycling and shredding, would come to our shul. We charge for each item that is brought in (hard drives, keyboards, sensitive documents, etc.); we keep the money and they destroy the computer data or shred the documents. They provide the brochures and we are responsible for the advertising. They suggest we make it a community-wide event.

Judy reported that she had run a book fair at Barnes and Noble that brought in \$1,300.

Bob suggested we put together a committee on “how to address financial issues.” The members will be Bob Nesoff, Dan Leib, Rob Chananie, Paul Auerbach and Charles Goldberg, plus a VP.

Jack announced that as of July 1, we will have a fundraising committee in place.

The rabbi suggested that we think about encouraging JCCP/CBT families to consider having funerals for their family members at our synagogue. We could bring in thousands of dollars by renting our chapel instead of having people rent chapels at funeral homes.

Roger suggested we look at how to recruit members who move from the city to our suburbs.

**DISCLOSURE OF CONTRACT DETAILS FOR PERSONNEL**

Harlan stated that we may need to review our current policy (set many decades ago) for disclosure to the BOT of personnel salaries. We recognize that privacy is an issue, so we need to assess the importance of changing this policy.

**NOMINATING COMMITTEE UPDATE**

As a result of Andy’s passing, Sandy Alpern has agreed to step up as chairperson. The committee currently consists of Sandy Alpern, Lili Baumzweig, Paul Duboff, Phyllis Glatzer, Rhonda Gordon, Audrey Hyman, Andy Jaffe and Dan Leibgott. Two trustees have reached their term limits; of the 5 trustees that can continue, 2 have already declined the offer. We need suggestions for 3rd VP, recording secretary and financial secretary.

**TOWN HALL STYLE MEETINGS**

Harlan has proposed these dates for the town hall meetings: March 23rd after the Men’s Club breakfast and March 26th in the evening.

Dairy, serves 8


*Ingredients:*


