## From the Rabbi

We are fortunate to live in a nation that respects the rule of law. As both a citizen of this nation and as a beneficiary of those laws, I am particularly interested in the way that the laws that govern our nation are occasionally challenged by another other great value in American society — freedom of religion and it’s long history, beginning with the First Amendment that guaranteed the freedom of religion for which this country is famous.

*Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.*

Yet some recent Supreme Court cases and proposed legislation in several states have demonstrated the difficulty that is often encountered when broad legal or policy objectives potentially impact upon the religious beliefs and practices of American citizens, or the religious organizations and corporations established to uphold and even promote these views.

I believe that it is of seminal importance to maintain both the value of a society ruled by law, as well as ever maintaining the ability for each and every American to abide by their faith. But as recent events have proved, it is easier said than done. How do we insure that both values are respected, even as they often collide in the public square?

Several years ago, *Hosanna-Tabor Evangelical Lutheran Church and School v. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, et al.* addressed the case of a Michigan teacher Cheryl Perich who contended that she was fired in violation of the Americans with Disabilities Act because she threatened to complain to the government about being turned away from her job when she fell ill. Her parochial school (Hosanna-Tabor Evangelical Lutheran Church and School) contended that she was fired for religious insubordination for not working out her grievance within the church family. The Court was confronted with the issue of whether the ADA could not apply to Ms. Perich because she was a “minister” under the “ministerial exception” to anti-bias law. The case however, soon engaged the larger question of church-state relations. Was the school, a religious corporation within their rights to fire her for not following church rules and procedures, or was she subject to the rules of the Americans with Disabilities Act?

Now let’s ask ourselves a question. Let’s examine the hypothetical example of a Jewish man or woman who wanted to apply for a job as a custodian of the JCCP/CBT. If we were simply a business owned by Jews, we would have no right to NOT hire him or her on that basis. But as a synagogue (a religious corporation in legal parlance) knowing that such a job demands doing things that are forbidden on Shabbat, we as a synagogue have the constitutional right NOT to hire him or her on the basis of his religion. Or to put the matter differently- we all love, appreciate and respect our Torah reader Rabbi Avram Kogen—but if he were to convert

to another faith we could fire him from on the basis that his new found faith precluded his performing his religious function for us. We could NOT do that to any of our current custodians—unless the new faith they chose was Judaism.

The earlier case I cited (*Hosanna-Tabor Evangelical Lutheran Church and School v. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, et al*) happened four years ago. But in recent weeks, a major challenge to HHS (Department of Health and Human Services) mandate that currently requires employers to include contraceptives (including products that can induce early-pregnancy abortions) in their insurance offerings coverage of all was brought by The Little Sisters of the Poor, a Catholic order, and heard by the Supreme Court. Their objection was that the HHS mandate violated their religious principles and beliefs. Additionally, a series of “Religious Freedom” laws, introduced in North Carolina, Georgia, and Mississippi designed to protect individuals from being compelled to provide services (primarily, it should be noted, as those opposed to such laws correctly point out) to homosexuals. I have not fully studied the full meaning or ramifications of all these laws, but I have learned enough to become comfortable with their intent. Yet I do anticipate another clash between the values of the rule of law, and the worth goal to eradicate all forms of discrimination in our great nation, and the free exercise of religion.

No matter how we may feel about the laws themselves, or the various policies that stem from them, we must all respect the boundaries that traditionally respect and protect the integrity of the religious institutions and their faith rules which at times conflict with other important values of our great nation — values that in other areas have led to great results.

And so should you — even if we question the motives behind such laws and even the intentions of the people who advocate for them. For the very same threats to religious liberty that affect one group one day, will almost certainly affect another group, at another time. And as history’s most persecuted religious entity, I am sure that all Jews can certainly understand that.

## From the Executive Director

Last month, I shared with you my belief that a Jewish community center (ours specifically but the generalization holds true) provides several different modules of "community", whether as prayer service, study cluster or social environment. Someone once suggested that a community is best defined as a group where "some of the people are unhappy at least some of the time" — meaning, of course, that to be in a community is to compromise, on both actions and ideology.

That definition is a little glib, so here's a better one: being a member of a community means supporting something that you may not be using at the time, but that you nevertheless value. For example, just this past month, the Rabbi officiated at three funeral services, one of a member, and two of parents of members. Now, God willing you won't need that particular service for many years, but your membership in our community allows him to give grieving families his full attention.

Many people consider resigning from their synagogue because they don't use it. But unlike utility bills and invoices from the dentist, we are asked to pay dues not based upon how much use we get from our synagogue but because we believe the institution is of genuine value, and we want it to be here. Whether you use it yourself or not, you want there to be a Sanctuary for those people who, at a certain moment in their lives want to enter a sacred space. You want those whose hearts are in need of an uplift to be inspired by the melodies of

our People and the voice of a Cantor that can bring them peace or joy. You want those who seek wisdom to be able to study our sacred texts and extract deeper meaning for their lives. You want a family who needs counseling to have a Rabbi to turn to; you want people who are suffering from an illness or recuperating from a serious accident to have their Rabbi at their bedside; we all want there to be a place for a young couple about to begin a life together to have their relationship sanctified so they continue the long line of Jewish lineage. We want there to be a place for a person in turmoil to turn to an attentive Rabbi for understanding and advice. We want there to be a place where a Jew can come to celebrate a milestone in their life, be it a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, an anniversary, or an 80th birthday. And we want Jews to have someone who knew them to eulogize them when they have departed from this life. That's why we send in our dues — not because we would be barred from services if we didn't, but because we have decided to help insure that the institution that gives so much to so many remains here in our community, and serves, without discrimination, anyone who yearns for its spiritual provisions.

Yes, dues are an obligation, but it should come from an inner sense of generosity, not from an external threat. It is something we should do because we see its importance whether we expect to use the facility every Shabbat, just come for High Holy Days, or don't come at all, but simply want there to be a place nearby because it ensures a Jewish presence in our community.

It's less about what you owe, and more about how much you can contribute. Not what is on the statement, but how you can help make our beloved synagogue be the very best place it can be: a place to keep Judaism alive, to keep the doors open for anyone in need, which, one day, may be you, or your child or your widowed spouse, or your Jewish neighbor. This is ultimately about advancing the mitzvah of meaningful Judaism, and it makes JCCP/CBT truly an institution worth preserving.

## ADE BERMAN & IRENE BRICKMAN



Irene and her late husband, Jyle, joined the JCCP in 1972. Irene grew up in Montclair where her father and his family were founding members of Congregation Shomrei Emunah. She remembers her parents being involved in Israel Bond drives. Her children Cindy, Marc, and Michael were b'nai mitzvah at the JCCP.

Cindy and her husband Dave Rivkin, although living in Fair Lawn, joined the JCCP/CBT when they wanted a Jewish education for their children. Rabbi Weiner was so supportive of the Brickman family during the difficult time when Cindy's dad Jyle was ill, that Cindy and Dave felt that the JCCP should be their synagogue. Irene's grandchildren Jennifer and Jonathan attended the JCCP/CBT Hebrew school and celebrated their b'nai mitzvah there. Michael and his wife Sherri have two children, Jacob and Garrett. Marc, recently engaged, is planning an August wedding. Irene taught first grade before her children were born and later worked at AAA in Oradell for many years. Irene still remembers how deeply her first trip to Israel with her college roommate affected her.

Ade and his late wife, Arlene, were very active in the synagogue and served the temple in many capacities. Ade brought klezmer and cantorial concerts to the center and during his presidency started the Purim celebration that is held annually. He chaired the endowment committee and was a long-time co-chair of the religious committee with Fred Lorsch. He has been a regular at the Wednesday morning minyan since 1974.

Ade, an accountant, works in Montvale at his firm, Adolph N. Berman, CPA. He has traveled to Israel many times and he and Arlene were longtime chairs of the Israel Bonds committee at the JCCP. Ade and Arlene's three sons Jeff, Bob, and Doug were b'nai mitzvah at the shul and live in Massachusetts, California, and Florida respectively. Ade has 6 grandchildren, Ze'eva (Sarah) and David, Gabrielle and Hannah, and Alexandra and Jacob.

Ade and Irene met in 2003 when they were both saying kaddish for their spouses. They became friends and had long talks in the shul parking lot after services, which helped them cope with their grief. Eventually, over the years, they became a couple. Irene and Ade volunteered separately when we hosted the Overflow Shelter for the Homeless and later they volunteered to do the overnight session together. They live in Glen Rock, but the JCCP/CBT is their second home. Their support and love for Israel is something they share.

## SHEL BERMAN



Shel and his late wife, Bernice, met as young adults, packing supplies for the newly formed State of Israel in 1948. As a couple, they began a lifelong commitment to each other, the State of Israel, and to Judaism. They first lived in Jersey City where they joined an Orthodox synagogue, and then

Maywood, where they joined a Conservative synagogue, then Paramus. Shel was very involved in the Hackensack lodge of B'nai B'rith, then the Bergen County B'nai B'rith and was a president of both. The Berman family, including their children Cheryl, Robin, and Michael, were active members of the JCCP. Shel chaired various events including a klezmer concert, scholar-in-residence weekend, and Torah dedication. He chaired the committee in charge of Rabbi Weiner's installation. He worked in retail and then as a partner with his father in a dry cleaning business in Newark, which he owned for 21 years. He then was the assistant director in New Jersey for Jewish National Fund.

Israel has always been of great importance to Shel and his family. Shel and Ade's father was on the executive board of Israel Bonds in Jersey City and Shel got involved with Bonds soon after he celebrated his bar mitzvah, going door to door to promote interest in investing in the State of Israel. He worked as a bonds salesman in his late teens, and Shel and Bernice received the Israel Bonds Jerusalem award in 1986. They always attended the Israel Day parades and Shel was involved with the UJA College Campus Youth program and for years led the Soviet Jewry Walk-a-Thon of Bergen County. B'nai B'rith and Lubavitch honored Shel as Man of the Year- and he received awards from UJA Federation and Kosher Meals on Wheels.

Shel's daughter, Robin, and husband Steve live in Saddle Brook with their children Alena and Jacob, and Michael and Cheryl live with their families in Israel. Shel has 12 more grandchildren in Israel along with 14 great-grandchildren, with two or possibly three more on the way. He visits them twice a year. Shel is considering making aliyah to Israel himself in the near future. Shel's connection to Israel has been strong for his entire life and he strongly believes that investing in Israel Bonds is a meaningful way to show support.

Add celery and pineapple and chill another 1/2 hour, then drain the juice.

For the dressing: mix the sour cream and mayonnaise; add the walnuts. Set aside and chill.

Mix the apples, celery, and pineapples with the dressing, an hour before serving and toss well.

If you want to make it pareve, eliminate the sour cream and add a cup of mayonnaise.




