From the Rabbi

Give generously!

It's a statement and a plea that all of us have heard many times. Who could disagree with such an idea?

Americans are a generous people. Private and corporate philanthropy in the United States is considered a great good, and actually encouraged by our government through policies that provide tax deductions for such donations. Religious organizations, schools and hospitals, and an array of other charities that do outstanding work are the recipients of our donations, and they do accomplish much good. According to the National Philanthropic Trust, a public charity dedicated to providing philanthropic expertise to donors:

- 95.4% of households gave to charity last year.
- The average annual household contribution was \$2,974.
- Americans gave \$335 billion in charitable donations in 2013. This reflects a 4.4% increase from 2011.
- Of this amount, 72% was given by individuals, 15% by foundations, 8% were bequests, and 5% was donated by corporations.

Sounds good doesn't it? It is not only a lot of money but also represents many Americans making both large and small donations to a variety of charities.

Yet a recent survey should challenge all of us. As reported in *The*

Chronicle, a leading source of news coverage of the nonprofit world, even as the income gap widens between the wealthy and non-wealthy, the wealthiest Americans are giving a smaller share of their income to charity, while poor and middle-income people are donating a larger share. Those making **less** than \$100,000 a year continue to increase their yearly charitable donations. Yet among those making **more** than \$100,000, and especially those making more than \$200,000, their donations have dropped 3.3% and 4.5%, respectively. That's a lot and deserves some attention.

Sociologists and economists who study (and worry) about these issues attribute this trend in decreased giving to several factors.

- Decreasing rates of religious affiliation and church/synagogue attendance.
- Decreasing levels of communal involvement in public, private and civic organizations.

As American Jews, we should pay attention to research like this. On the one hand, we can be very proud of our own religious and philanthropic traditions. Charitable giving is considered a *mitzvah*, a commandment and obligation that Jews have faithfully observed for 3,300 years. Indeed, the very idea of *tithing*, of donating a fixed 10% of one's income, is an ancient biblical concept. And our rabbis and sages instituted an even higher level of giving for those who could afford to do so. In America, Jews are more likely to donate to charities than non-Jews, as well as donate at a higher rate.

Yet at the same time, we are not immune to larger demographic trends in our nation. Thankfully, the household income of most Jewish families in America exceeds \$100,000. Yet that is the very group that is reporting lower levels of charitable giving. Similarly, too many American Jews are not regularly affiliating with synagogues

and other large Jewish communal organizations. These two factors point the way toward diminishing Jewish charitable giving in the future. And that is a great concern. Nearly all significant Jewish organizations and religious institutions in America are nonprofits that depend on the generosity of their members and those who believe in the mission of the organizations to help support them financially.

What the survey on American charitable giving is telling us is that there is a significant link between one's religious commitment and identification with the goals of the organization they serve, and the level of charitable giving. Indeed, the highest levels of giving are in Utah and the Bible Belt states, where religious affiliation is highest, and lowest in the Northeast, where religious affiliation rates are the lowest in the nation. In other words, for many, charitable giving is fraught with religious significance. It makes a statement about who we are, what we believe, and what we hope for the future. If you think about it, the same could be

said for any mitzvah or religious commandment, but perhaps especially so with charitable giving, which is where our hearts and hands come together.

In Judaism, we don't really have a term for what we might consider charity, or charitable giving. Instead, these types of actions are under the rubric of a wonderful term: **Tzedaka**, or in English, **Righteousness**. Imagine that: Early on in our history, our rabbis and teachers understood the relationship between charitable giving and righteous, noble behavior. These lessons were well understood by the many generations of Jews who preceded us, and they continue to be practiced by Jews today.

So the next time someone or some organization — especially our synagogue and Jewish organizations — ask for your donations, think of the important religious statement that you are making by sacrificing some of your precious resources in support of their holy work.

Give generously!

From the Executive Director

It is *Chol Hamoed Sukkot* as I sit to write my November column and Thanksgiving cannot be too far away. Having just spent the better part of a month in shul, many things come to mind, but most importantly, my desire to be a better person this coming year both generally and Jewishly.

While sitting in my home synagogue's sanctuary for the *Yom Tovim*, I had the chance to read, think and plan just how to accomplish this plan. One tool I found available was a handout compiled by my rabbi that offered many inspirational and contemplative excerpts. One of the selections resonated within me, probably because of what I do for a living.

Dr. Ron Wolfson, the Fingerhut Professor of Education at American Jewish University as well as founder of the "Synagogue 3000," spends a great amount of time teaching and writing about converting synagogues from "transactional" organizations into "relational" ones. The latter, where people connect with one another and establish lasting friendships, is far superior and much more rewarding.

So it was with special interest that I read an excerpt from his *Spirituality of Welcoming, "Jewish Values to Guide Communications."* Wolfson lists seven Jewish values that we should incorporate into our synagogue lexicon and behavior, and some hints to help us model them:


- 1) **Sh'tikah & Sh'miat Ha-Ozen: Silence & Active Listening**
 - a) Reflect in silence while others are speaking
 - b) Refrain from interrupting while others are speaking
- 2) **Dibbur: Speech**
 - a) Speak the truth as you see it, but ...
 - b) Don't hurt others by speaking harshly to or about them
 - c) Speak as if God was listening to everything you say
- 3) **Salvanut: Patience**
 - a) Be patient while others are speaking; wait your turn
 - b) Have empathy towards others and their opinions
- 4) **Elu v'elu: "These and these"**
 - a) Allow for multiple perspectives
 - b) Even if you don't agree with others, don't be condescending towards them
- 5) **B'yachad: Together**
 - a) Let's think of each other as teammates
 - b) Progress emerges from collaboration
 - c) Even davening requires a minyan!
- 6) **Derech Eretz: Common decency towards others**
 - a) Treat each other with mutual respect
 - b) Remember, everyone present is on the same side
- 7) **L'Shem Shamayim: For the sake of Heaven, and Da Lifnei Mi atah Omed: Know before whom you stand**

I'm going to try to remember that our congregation is a *Sacred Community* and not just a building. It is a collection of individuals who share a common goal and a profound love of Judaism. It is "all about the relationships" we develop that keeps us together in good times and bad. We support each other spiritually, emotionally and socially. For this and the many other blessings in our lives, I say thank you.

Enjoy your Thanksgiving and the bountiful year to come.






