### **SELICHOT 2022**



Our annual Selichot observance will take place on Zoom on Saturday evening, September 17th at 8:45PM. We hope you will join us for this service, which serves as the formal beginning of the High Holiday season.

During this service, we recite prayers that concentrate on the great ideas of the High Holidays. The prayers and the High Holiday *nusach* (melodies) are meant to help us focus on *T'shuvah* (repentance), Slicha (forgiveness), and Kaparah (atonement). One of the highlights of the service is the repetition of the 13 Attributes, a descriptive passage from Exodus (34:67) that expresses God's merciful nature:

The Lord! The Lord! A God compassionate and gracious, slow to anger, rich in steadfast kindness, extending kindness to the thousandth generation, forgiving iniquity, transgression, and sin; yet He does not remit all punishment...

Sephardic communities begin reciting Selichot at the beginning of Elul so that a period of 40 days, similar to the time Moses spent on Mount Sinai, is devoted to prayers of forgiveness. The practice among Ashkenazi Jews is to begin saying them on the Saturday night prior to Rosh Hashanah. However, if there are fewer than four days between the beginning of Selichot and Rosh Hashanah, the prayers are begun the previous Saturday night. As my revered teacher, the late Rabbi Dr. Reuven Hammer wrote some years ago in his masterful explanation of the High Holidays, "the conclusion of the Sabbath was considered particularly propitious for such prayers of forgiveness, since it marks the beginning of a new week and the completion of a sacred day of rest and study."

The Selichot service can be quite moving. We sense the extraordinary nature of the prayer and turn introspectively within ourselves. The prayers themselves are pleas for mercy. The melodies are sad and full of longing. As Cantor Weiss leads the prayers wearing his Kittel, the white garment reserved for the High Holidays, he is expressing the despair that accompanies separation from God and the desire to change and repent. Selichot helps us to consider how we can break the cycle of our lives and change ourselves for the better.

### Live Streaming 5783-2022 **High Holiday Services**

We are pleased to be offering live streaming of our High Holiday services again this year, except for Tashlich. In general, our programs and services have been through Zoom, which allows participants to see, communicate and share information with one another through a two-way broadcast. In contrast to Zoom, which is interactive, Livestream is a one-way broadcast, a bit more formal, and thus appropriate for the High Holidays. All our Shabbat morning services have been Livestreamed this past year.

Our camera is positioned to view the entire bimah area where Rabbi Weiner, Cantor Weiss, Rabbi Kogen and our members will be davening. Unlike Zoom, you will be able to view the service, but you will not be seen on screen. We still would love to see you in person but hope that congregants will feel like a part of our community from home if they are unable or hesitant to attend in person. ### From the Rabbi



Rabbi Arthur D. Weiner

I spend a lot of time in cemeteries. Now that may be a strange way to start a High Holiday bulletin article, but there are a lot of important lessons and a lot of wisdom that can be learned there if you know how to listen. When one spends time in a cemetery and pays attention, you see a great deal of history. There are pillars and plaques that record the name of burial societies that were established by generations of Jews who arrived between 1880 and 1920. There are markers that announce the names of synagogues that own land for the burial of their members. In their own way, they tell the story

of the commitment of Jews to ensure the burial of their loved ones and community members according to Judaism's values, customs, and laws. I have learned so much about the history of Jews in New Jersey by my hundreds of visits over the years local cemeteries throughout the state.

But even more important, cemeteries tell stories of individuals. As you wander through the cemetery you pay attention to the stones. What do you find there?

Beloved mother, devoted father, a friend to many

Rabbi, teacher, communal leader

Holocaust survivor

An honorable man

A woman of valor

A man/woman of compassion, generosity, kindness, and good deeds A proud Jew

You too have been to cemeteries and have seen these stones. You find that they attest to the loving relationships that individuals forged, their work on behalf of the greater community, the positive influence they had upon their families and communities, and the kindness and compassion they devoted to others during the course of their lifetime. I have helped hundreds of families over the years with their headstones and footstones, and almost every one faced the same problem. How can we sum up all we want to say in the five or seven or nine lines that are allotted to us?

In 1888, the obituary section of a French newspaper mistakenly eulogized Alfred Nobel. It was actually his brother, Ludwig, that had died. You may recall that Nobel was the inventor of dynamite. The newspaper characterized him as someone who had grown rich by developing new ways to "mutilate and kill." Nobel was both hurt as well as shaken by this premature obituary and the statement it made about his life. As a result, he rewrote his will leaving most of his fortune to a cause that would be admired and celebrated by all. He established the Nobel Prize that to this day is given to scientists, writers, and peacemakers to recognize and encourage efforts that better all humanity. He wanted to be remembered differently.

What do you want your tombstone to say about you? And more importantly, what statement about our lives do we want to make to ourselves? This season of the year, during the Hebrew month of Elul that precedes Rosh Hashanah, is the time that Jewish tradition challenges each of us to ask these questions, and answer them honestly.

What do you need to do right now to make sure that you are living your life in such a way that you are leaving a positive impact on those who look to you for guidance and values?

What do you need to do to live your life with more purpose, more satisfaction, and more joy?

Who do you need to repair a relationship with?

What simple (or maybe not so simple) pleasure or joy have you denied yourself?

And what efforts are you willing to expend to try to make the adjustments that could improve lives, and whose benefits will be enjoyed now and in the

Your parents, spouses, or children cannot answer for you. This is work for you alone.

What do we need to accomplish this year? I'm a firm believer that each one of us knows the answer to these questions. It's simply a matter of taking the time to ask the hard questions that can lead to real growth and improvement. That is what the High Holidays are all about. They remind us that our time on this earth ultimately is finite. What can we do this year that will help us to live in a manner that matches our true potential?

L'Shanah Tovah from my family to yours,

We use a variety of Hebrew words and terms throughout the High Holidays days. It is increasingly clear to Rabbis and Jewish educators that many of the terms and words we use are familiar, but are not fully understood by all. We need to change that. I want to share and define some words and terms in the hope that they will add to your understanding as well as provide additional opportunities for you to connect with the great ideas, themes, observances, and traditions of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

#### Must-Know Rosh Hashanah Words and Phrases

Akedah. Pronounced ah-keh-DAH. Literally "binding," the Akedah refers to the biblical story of the binding of Isaac, which is traditionally read on the second day of Rosh Hashanah.

Chag sameach. Pronounced KHAG sah-MAY-akh. Literally "happy holiday," a common greeting on Rosh Hashanah and other Jewish holidays.

**Elul**. Pronounced el-OOL (oo as in food). The final month of the Jewish calendar, it is designated as a time of reflection, introspection and repen-

Het (also chet). Pronounced KHET (short e). Sin, or wrongdoing

L'shana tovah u'metukah. Pronounced I'shah-NAH toe-VAH ooh-mehtoo-KAH. A Hebrew greeting for the High Holiday season that means, "For a good and sweet year."

**Machzor**. Pronounced MAHKH-zohr. Literally "cycle," the machzor is the special prayer book for the High Holidays, containing all the special High Holiday liturgy

**Selichot**. Pronounced slee-KHOTE. Literally "forgivenesses," *Selichot* are prayers for forgiveness. Selichot refers to two related types of penitential prayers. The first are the prayers that are customarily recited daily at morning services during the month of Elul. This is also the name of the service that takes place late at night on the Saturday preceding Rosh Hashanah (August 28, 2021) and consists of a longer series of these penitential prayers.

**Shofar**. Pronounced shoh-FAR or SHOH-far (rhymes with "so far"). The ram's horn that is sounded during the month of Elul, on Rosh Hashanah, and at the end of Yom Kippur. It is mentioned numerous times in the Bible, in reference to its ceremonial use in the Temple and to its function as a signal-horn of war.

Tashlich. Pronounced TAHSH-likh. Literally "cast away," Tashlich is a ceremony observed on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah, in which sins are symbolically cast away into a natural body of water. The term and custom are derived from a verse in the Book of Micah (Micah 7:19).

### **COVID COMMITTEE UPDATE**

Dear JCCP/CBT members,

We want to update you regarding our progress with continuing to resume the operations of the synagogue in a safe manner. As you know, we have put safeguards into effect to protect the congregation against the COVID-19 virus and the variants which now present a problem. We have mandated that all individuals wishing to attend events within the building be double vaccinated, have at least one booster, and wear a mask.

#### During the past year

- · We installed Zoom capability in the chapel, and plan to use it shortly for in-person Board of Trustees meetings, minyans, and other synagogue events.
- We have added full lay participation to Shabbat and holiday services.
- · Our in person social activities now include mahjongg, canasta, exercise classes, movies, and a book club (all following the masking policies).
- In person Hebrew School has returned to our building.
- Our gymnasium continues to be used for basketball rentals on Sundays and several nights during the
- The synagogue is open for committee meetings and gatherings, following our policy of masking and no food (being served indoors).
- Adult education will return to the building in the

The COVID Committee, in consultation with the Medical Committee and the Rabbi, will continue to act in the best interest of the synagogue and every congregant. 
hopeful for the future and certainly look forward to the day when we will not have to be masked, but, for the time being, it is a small price to pay to keep everyone safe.




### **COOKING CORNER**

### ~ from Beth Chananie ~

Thought it would be great to include this VERY simple yummy recipe to make for a break-the-fast get-together or Sukkot lunch, or honestly for any time, brunch or otherwise. It comes from the 2003 JCCP Sisterhood cookbook, "Recipes From the Heart." I have made this blintz dish countless times – it's one of my favorites and has a paper clip to save the page in my book (which is held together by a rubber band). Anyway, it was submitted by a former congregant, Myrna Levine, who passed away last month. She was an amazing woman.

So, Myrna, z"l, this one is for you... and for all your JCCP/CBT friends, old and new, to enjoy! She would have loved that.



### BLINTZ SOUFFLE

### Ingredients:

12 frozen blintzes\*\*

1 cup sour cream

6 eggs

1/2 cup sugar

1 stick butter

1/2 cup orange juice

1 teaspoon vanilla

Cinnamon sugar for sprinkling

#### **Instructions:**

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray a lasagne size Pyrex baking dish (or any oven proof pan) with Pam spray. Melt 1/4 stick butter in the dish for 2 minutes in the oven and then remove the pan, swirling around the butter. Line the blintzes up in the dish.

Quickly melt the remaining butter in the microwave and pour over the blintzes.

Put all the other ingredients (not cinnamon) in the blender on high for about 1 1/2 minutes until frothy. Pour over the blintzes. Sprinkle with cinnamon sugar.

Bake uncovered for 1 hour. Serve warm. Enjoy!

\*\*Note from Beth... Lately, I have been cutting the frozen blintzes in half. It is tricky and be careful when cutting... but it truly makes for easier placement and serving. I also only use cheese blintzes; if Rob ever got a bite of fruit one - I think he would gag... but feel free to use cheese and all kinds of fruit.. try to keep the same blintz sections together.




