

In 1938, Jack's parents, Alfred and Martha, and brother Howard came to the United States to escape the Holocaust. Jack's family settled in Washington Heights, New York where Jack and his late sister, Carol, were born. Later, Jack's

Sandy moved back to Bergenfield in 1972.



Fran Mitchel and Richard Winters first met in 1957 as students at Yavneh Academy. Fran, the daughter of Holocaust survivors and devoted JCCP members Dr. Selma and Stanley Mitchel (z"l), was born in Germany. Her family emigrated to the United States in 1948, initially settling in Brooklyn before moving to Paramus in 1956, where they quickly became active members of our synagogue.

Richard was born in Paterson, New Jersey, and went on to attend Yavneh Academy, Hackensack High School, Rutgers College, and New York Medical College, where he earned his M.D. in

family moved to Bergenfield, where Jack attended his last two years at Bergenfield High School. Jack graduated from Rutgers with a BA in History and later received an MA in History and an MBA in Management from Fairleigh Dickinson.

From 1974 to 1986, Jack worked as an internal auditor for Kidde, Inc. His role required extensive travel across the country-typically from Monday to Friday-for about 40 weeks each year. While Jack was on the road, Sandy remained at home, raising their daughters, Michel and Samara.

Even with all his travel, Jack became active in the BDJC. He was elected as a Trustee in 1972, later serving as Treasurer, First Vice President and then President. Jack will never forget the morning in February 1984, while he was in San Francisco, when he received a call from Sandy that their beloved synagogue had burned down.

Jack was appointed Chairman of the Rebuilding Committee, and with the help of the entire community, the synagogue was rebuilt. Jack was President when the BDJC reopened in 1987. He served as President from 1987 to 1988 and again from 1993 to 1994.

In 2002, due to several changes within the BDJC, Sandy and Jack became disillusioned with their once beloved shul. By chance they came upon the JCCP and found that they felt at home again and have been proud and active members since.

Jack became involved in our synagogue almost from the moment he and Sandy joined the JCCP. He played an integral role in arranging our merger with the New Milford Jewish Center, Congregation Beth Tikvah. He served on the synagogue board as Vice President and served as President of the JCCP/CBT from 2014 - 2016. During his presidency, he implemented our current security measures and completely modernized our building infrastructure, including our new roof and air conditioning, heating and electrical systems. He is also responsible for establishing our Human Resources Committee where he presently serves as co-chair.

In 1997, the Bauer's daughter Michel married her husband, David. They have two daughters, Melissa and Ariel. Jack and Sandy's younger daughter Samara married her husband Scott in 2010.

Jack is a staunch supporter of both our Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat Zoom services and Shabbat morning services. He has also been a regular at our evening Zoom minyanim almost every night since they began in 2020, sometimes leading services. He and his co-honoree for Selichot, Rich Wintersboth Kohanim-often alternate taking the Kohen aliyah on Shabbat.

The JCCP/CBT is pleased to honor Jack at Selichot for his dedicated support of the religious life of our synagogue.

Upon his graduation, they settled in Paramus, where they raised their two children, Leslie and Steven.

Leslie and her husband Michael live in Upper Saddle River with their children, Jaymie and Jack. Jaymie is currently pursuing her MSW at Loyola University in Chicago, and Jack is a senior at the University of Michigan, studying sports business. Steven, a certified personal trainer, lives in Florida.

Since moving to Paramus, Fran and Richard have been dedicated members of the JCCP/CBT community. They joined the Young Couples Club early on, with Richard serving as its president. Over the years, Richard has served our synagogue in many capacities: as a trustee, on the Strategic Planning Committee, the Nominating Committee, and the Religious Committee. He and Fran have also been long-time members of the Board of Governors, including serving as co-chairs.

Professionally, Richard has had a distinguished career in psychiatry. He served as an Associate Professor in the Department of Psychiatry at New York Medical College, his alma mater, and held several leadership roles at Metropolitan Hospital, including Director of Psychiatry Residency Training, Clinical Director of the Psychiatric Emergency Room, and Director of Continuing Education in Psychiatry. He was also an Attending Psychiatrist at Hackensack University Medical Center, Gracie Square Hospital, and Doctor's Hospital. Richard is a Diplomate of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology and a Distinguished Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association. Although he officially "retired" in 2007, he continues to maintain a thriving private practice in both Paramus and New York City.

Richard has received national recognition, including citations from the American Psychiatric Association for Excellence in Medical Student Education. He also served on the Physicians Cabinet of the United Jewish Community of Bergen County, blending his professional and communal commitments.

At the JCCP/CBT, Richard is perhaps best known for his inspiring davening and beautiful voice. He serves as Gabbai during Shabbat services, leads Pesukei D'Zimrah during the High Holy Days, and has chanted the Rosh Hashanah Haftorah for an incredible 49 consecutive years—a beloved synagogue tradition. A dedicated and frequent attendee of Shabbat services, Richard is often called upon to lead parts of the service, often on short notice.

Each summer, the popular JCCP/CBT "Shabbat Under the Stars" Friday night services are held in the Winters' stunning backyard garden—a true community highlight.

It is with great pleasure and heartfelt appreciation that we invite our synagogue family to honor Dr. Richard Winters at our Selichot services.



From the Rabbi

"Go unto the mountain and be there." ~ Exodus 24:12

The famed Hasidic leader Rabbi Menachem Mendel of Kotsk once asked: If God told Moses to "go unto the mountain," why add the words "and be there"? Isn't being there implied by going? His answer: One can stand on the mountain and not truly be there.

I think we understand what he meant. We've all lived that kind of absence: present in body, elsewhere in spirit. Sitting at the dinner table while scrolling through a phone. Attending a meeting while rehearsing tomorrow's to-do list.

Sitting in the sanctuary but drifting in thoughts that have nothing to do with prayer, reflection, or return.

As we enter the High Holiday season, this teaching becomes more than clever commentary. It becomes a gentle, urgent summons.

The High Holidays are not only about ritual or tradition. They are not just about showing up. They are about allowing ourselves to be engaged, fully, deeply, and honestly. They are the soul's way of saying: I am not just on this mountain. I am here. In this moment. With intention. With attention. With heart.

So we ask: Where else in our lives are we only partially present?

With our loved ones: are we truly listening, or just exchanging words? Do we hear the guiet beneath their sentences? Do we pause long enough to notice the tiredness in their voice, the joy in a passing glance, the need that remains unsaid? Presence in relationship means more than proximity. It means being attentive, not only to words, but to silences.

In our homes: are we nurturing connection or letting comfort breed indifference? Do we build our homes as sanctuaries of warmth and meaning? Presence means consciously making space for each other, and remembering that love grows through small acts of care.

In our congregation—do we come to feel, or only to fulfill? Community is not a checklist. When we walk through synagogue doors, do we allow ourselves to feel something special? Do we make room for awe, for discomfort, for joy? Presence in prayer and community means bringing our whole selves, not just our habits, but our hopes.

In our work—are we cultivating purpose, or just completing tasks?

Do we see our daily labor as contributing to something greater? Do we connect our tasks with our values? Do we honor our colleagues with dignity and care? Being present at work means refusing to let productivity eclipse purpose. It means remembering that every hour we give has weight and deserves attention.

The Kotsker Rebbe knew that presence is spiritual work. It's not just about being somewhere. It's about being awake to the holiness in that moment. When we choose to truly "be there," we open ourselves to growth, healing, and transformation. Isn't that what the High Holidays are all about?

This year, let us pray and work, not to be perfect, but to be present. And may that newfound awareness lead us not only to better days, but to a happier, healthier, and more fulfilling New Year.

L'shana Tovah – A happy and healthy new year to all.



Must-Know Rosh Hashanah Words and Phrases

We use a variety of Hebrew words and terms throughout the High Holidays days. It is increasingly clear to Rabbis and Jewish educators that many of the terms and words we use are familiar, but are not fully understood by all. We need to change that. I want to share and define some words and terms in the hope that they will add to your understanding as well as provide additional opportunities for you to connect with the great ideas, themes, observances, and traditions of Rosh Hashanah and

Akedah. Pronounced ah-keh-DAH. Literally "binding," the Akedah refers to the biblical story of the binding of Isaac, which is traditionally read on the second day of Rosh Hashanah.

Chag sameach. Pronounced KHAG sah-MAY-akh. Literally "happy holiday," a common greeting on Rosh Hashanah and other Jewish holidays. **<u>Elul.</u>** Pronounced el-OOL (oo as in food). The final month of the Jewish calendar, it is designated as a time of reflection, introspection and

Het. (also chet). Pronounced KHET (short e). Sin, or wrongdoing. L'shana tovah u'metukah. Pronounced I'shah-NAH toe-VAH ooh-mehtoo-KAH. A Hebrew greeting for the High Holiday season that means, "For a good and sweet year."

Machzor. Pronounced MAHKH-zohr. Literally "cycle," the *machzor* is the special prayer book for the High Holidays, containing all the special High Holiday liturgy.

Selichot. Pronounced slee-KHOTE. Literally "forgivenesses," *Selichot* are prayers for forgiveness. Selichot refers to two related types of penitential prayers. The first are the prayers that are customarily recited daily at morning services during the month of Elul. This is also the name of the service that takes place late at night on the Saturday preceding Rosh Hashanah (August 28, 2021) and consists of a longer series of these penitential prayers.

Shofar. Pronounced shoh-FAR or SHOH-far (rhymes with "so far"). The ram's horn that is sounded during the month of Elul, on Rosh Hashanah, and at the end of Yom Kippur. It is mentioned numerous times in the Bible, in reference to its ceremonial use in the Temple and to its function as a signal-horn of war.

<u>Tashlich</u>. Pronounced TAHSH-likh. Literally "cast away," *Tashlich* is a ceremony observed on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah, in which sins are symbolically cast away into a natural body of water. The term and custom are derived from a verse in the Book of Micah (Micah 7:19).

To increase the awareness and observance of *Sukkot* among our membership and the larger community, the Jewish Community Center of Paramus/Congregation Beth Tikvah will again provide *Lulavim* and *Etrogim* from Israel for those who wish to order them. They will be delivered to our congregation straight from our supplier in Israel, ready for the joyous festival of Sukkot. **Sukkot begins on Tuesday evening, October 7, 2025**.

We encourage each family in the congregation to purchase a Lulav and Etrog and observe this great *Mitzvah*. Each set will include all the four species: the *etrog*, the *lulav*, the *hadassim* (myrtle), and *aravot* (willow). The price for each set is \$45.00.

The deadline for orders is September 30, 2025

Your *Lulav* and *Etrog* will be ready for pickup on Tuesday, October 7, 2025, and throughout the observance of Sukkot.

Hersh Goldberg Polin's **Chocolate Chip Cookies**

Continuing our tradition of including delicious recipes for our loyal JCCP/CBT family, we decided to reprint a special one that ran in the *Jewish Standard*. It was in honor of American-Israeli Hersh Goldberg-Polin,* 23, who was wounded and abducted by Hamas during the Re'im music festival massacre on October 7, 2023. He was held hostage for almost 11 months, until his body was recovered from a tunnel in Rafah in the Gaza Strip on August 31, 2024.

This recipe, Hersh's favorite cookies, was reprinted with permission from Norene's Kitchen Facebook page, the Gilletz family; it came from Hersh Goldberg-Polin's family. We hope everyone who makes the sweet recipe we chose for the New Year smiles and thinks of Hersh, z"l, and remembers and prays for him and all the other hostages.

*Side note, Hersh Goldberg-Polin was one of the original hostages our shul "adopted" to especially pray for.



Ingredients:

1 cup softened butter

1/2 cup white sugar

11/4 cups of brown sugar - can use all brown or all white

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

½ teaspoon cardamom

½ teaspoon cinnamon

2 large eggs

21/4 cups white flour - Half spelt is a fun twist

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon of salt

2 cups chocolate chips

Instructions:

In a mixer with a flat beater, mix the butter with sugars and spices until smooth. Gradually add the eggs, mixing for another two minutes. In a separate bowl, mix all the other ingredients, except the chips. Then, gently mix together and add the chocolate chips, until everything is mixed. Cover the bowl and put in the refrigerator, at least half an hour, or even overnight. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Roll out the cookie dough and use a cookie cutter to make small balls. Place on a cookie sheet lined with parchment paper. Gently flatten the cookies and leave space in between for baking. Bake for about 10 minutes until the cookies are golden brown, but soft in the center. Remove and cool on a wire rack and wait for the compliments to roll in.
